MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING  
OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

OPENING CEREMONIES:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

The Torrance City Council convened in a Regular Meeting on Tuesday, January 2, 1973, at 5:30 P.M. in the Council Chambers at Torrance City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Present: Councilmen Armstrong, Brewster, Sciarrotta, Surber, Uerkwitz, Wilson, and Mayor Miller. Absent: None.

Also present: City Manager Ferraro, Assistant City Manager Scharfman, City Attorney Remelmeyer, City Clerk Coil, and City Treasurer Rupert.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

Civil Service Officer Donovan led in the salute to the flag.

4. INVOCATION:

The invocation was given by Reverend DeWitt J. Brady, Seaside Community Church.

STANDARD MOTIONS:

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved that the minutes of December 12, 1972 be approved as recorded. His motion was seconded by Councilman Brewster; roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

6. APPROVAL OF DEMANDS:

Councilman Uerkwitz moved that all properly audited demands be paid. His motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

7. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Wilson moved that after the Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each Councilman the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The motion was seconded by Councilman Surber, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

8. COUNCIL COMMITTEE MEETINGS.Public Works Committee:

Met this date to further consider the new City Hall dedication, as well as a public works item which will be brought back to the Council by way of a written report.

Ad Hoc Committee on Commissions and Committees:

Councilman Armstrong noted agenda item #12 this date, a Committee report in this matter.

RESOLUTION NO. 73-1

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE AND ATTEST THAT CERTAIN AGREEMENT FOR THE PURCHASE OF PARCEL NO. 2 REQUIRED FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE INTERSECTION OF CRENSHAW AND SEPULVEDA BOULEVARDS.

(Getty Oil Company)

Councilman Sciarrotta moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 73-1. His motion was seconded by Councilman Armstrong, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

TRAFFIC AND LIGHTING:

10. REPLACEMENT FOR STOLEN AUTOMATIC MACHINE TRAFFIC COUNTER.

RECOMMENDATION OF CITY TRAFFIC ENGINEER:

That Council appropriate \$450.00 for full purchase price of one demonstrator model Streeter Amet automatic machine traffic counter. (Appropriation from General Fund).

MOTION: Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur with the above recommendation of the City Traffic Engineer. His motion was seconded by Councilman Surber, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

FISCAL MATTERS:11. CITY ATTORNEY'S BUDGET REVISION.RECOMMENDATION OF CITY ATTORNEY:

That Council:

1. Allocate another position of Deputy City Attorney;
2. Appropriate \$6,770.40 from existing General Fund Surplus in order to pay the Deputy for the remaining six months of this fiscal year; and
3. As Redevelopment Agency, add the position of Assistant Counsel of the Redevelopment Agency on a temporary basis.

CITY MANAGER'S NOTE:

In regard to Item 1., the authorizing of one additional permanent Deputy City Attorney, it is RECOMMENDED that this request be approved, referring that matter then to the Council Finance Committee for consideration of how the position will be funded. Since an examination for the new position of Assistant City Attorney has not yet been scheduled, it may be possible to utilize some of the monies appropriated for that position rather than funding the Deputy position from the City's unappropriated reserve.

Item 2., additional legal counsel, should be referred to the Redevelopment Agency for proper consideration.

MOTION: Councilman Uerkwitz moved that the above request be referred to the Council Finance Committee. His motion was seconded by Mayor Miller; there were no objections, and it was so ordered.

A meeting for such consideration was scheduled for Thursday, January 4, 1973, at 5:00 P.M.

MATTERS NOT OTHERWISE CLASSIFIED:12. RECOMMENDATION TO ADOPT BASIC CRITERIA AND AN APPROACH TO REVIEWING THE APPOINTED GROUP PROCESS.RECOMMENDATION OF COUNCIL AD HOC COMMITTEE ON APPOINTED GROUPS.

That Council approve the following criteria as guidelines in the examination of what specific appointed groups should serve the Torrance City Council.

1. Council should maintain a policy of utilizing viable Commissions which assist in decision making, while maintaining active Boards and Committees to provide advice to Council on particular subjects.
2. Council should encourage a continuous working relationship including periodic meetings between the Council's appointed groups and the standing committees of the Council.
3. Appointees to Boards, Commissions and Committees should be qualified Torrance electors, except when less than voter-age appointees are desired, or when a special expertise is desired for which there are not available, qualified Torrance citizens.

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4. The current concept of publicly recruiting applications for appointments and conducting public interviews should be maintained.
5. Four-year terms, on a staggered basis, should be utilized for appointed groups.
6. As a general rule of thumb, the size of appointed groups should be seven, consistent with the Council's size.
7. Remuneration, in lieu of ordinary expenses, should remain as is: \$30/calendar quarter, recognizing a variation in rate for the Civil Service, Airport and Planning Commissions.
8. Service by an individual on any one appointed group should be limited to two full terms plus any time spent completing an unexpired term. Implementation of this concept would be effected as each term expires, meaning that present appointees would not begin their two-term limit until they began a new term.
9. The current method of appointing members to the various groups (as typically described, "The members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Mayor with the approval of the City Council") should be retained. Committee member Surber takes exception to this recommendation, calling instead for each Councilman having one nomination/appointed group but still requiring approval of the entire City Council.
10. The mechanism for removing an appointee is considered adequate by the Council Committee. Typically, this statement is, "The members of the Commission may be removed from office by a vote of the majority of all members of the City Council." Cause, sufficient to a majority of the Council, is required for any action to be taken. In addition, an appointee's membership is automatically terminated if attendance falls below established standards (missing more than 24% of all regular meetings in any four consecutive calendar months).

Concern and reservations pertaining to recommendation #8 were noted in view of instances of particularly outstanding dedication and service to the City by these Commission members -- by Councilman Sciarrotta. It was clarified that the above recommendation #8 as applied to present incumbents would mean that the first of their two terms would begin on their reappointment.

Mayor Miller commented on his feeling that there should be review of a two-term limit on the Mayor's position as well -- there should be a turnover of people and "new blood" for effective government. Such a requirement for Council members was likewise advocated by Councilman Surber. It was the consensus of the Council that the foregoing is a matter for the Charter Review Committee.

MOTION: Councilman Wilson moved approval of the recommendations of the Council Ad Hoc Committee on Appointed Groups. His motion was seconded by Councilman Armstrong.

Prior to roll call vote, Councilman Uerkwitz referred to Recommendation #9 (method of appointment of members) and indicated that he favors positive appointment by a Councilman to Commissions and Committees -- but he does not wish to cast a "no" vote against the Committee recommendations. Councilman Surber expressed like feelings -- Councilmanic appointment, with Council approval as a body -- but likewise desires to cast an affirmative vote.

Roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

It was confirmed by Councilman Armstrong, at the City Attorney's question as to whether or not the above should be enacted into law, that they are, at this time, working guidelines of the Committee.

RESOLUTION NO. 73-2

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE URGING THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY TO TAKE APPROPRIATE MEASURES TO PROTECT PRIVATELY OWNED OPEN SPACE AS DESIGNATED IN THE COUNTY ENVIRONMENTAL DEVELOPMENT GUIDE (EDG).

Councilman Wilson moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 73-2, and his motion was seconded by Councilman Armstrong.

Prior to roll call vote on the motion, discussion was directed to the "privately owned property" reference -- it was agreed that the City Attorney-recommended wording "insofar as the law permits" be incorporated in the resolution.

Resolution No. 73-2 was, therefore, returned to the City Attorney's office for above noted revision, prior to formal adoption thereof.

PLANNING AND ZONING HEARINGS:

19. ZC 72-27, TORRANCE PLANNING COMMISSION.  
Change of zone from C-2 and R-1 to M-1 and C-5 on property located east of Hawthorne Boulevard between Pacific Coast Highway and Skypark Drive (Redevelopment Agency).

An Affidavit of Publication was presented by City Clerk Coil, and it was ordered filed, there being no objection.

Mayor Miller announced that this is the time and place for the public hearing on ZC 72-27, and inquired if anyone wished to be heard. There was no response.

Councilman Wilson moved that the hearing be closed. His motion was seconded by Councilman Brewster; roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

MOTION: Councilman Wilson moved to concur with the recommendation of the Planning Commission re: ZC 72-27. His motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

ADDENDUM ITEM:

27. UNDERGROUND UTILITY DISTRICT #3.

RECOMMENDATION OF CITY MANAGER/UNDERGROUND UTILITIES COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN:

1. That the City Council set 7 p.m., January 23, 1973, as the time and date of a public hearing on this matter.
2. That the City Council designate the area indicated on the attached map as the subject area for said hearing.
3. That the City Council direct the City Clerk to notify all property owners in the affected area.

MOTION: Councilman Armstrong moved to concur with the above recommendation. His motion, seconded by Councilman Wilson, was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

28. It was the request of Councilman Armstrong that adjournment of this meeting be to the memory of the late President Harry S. Truman as a tribute to the honor he afforded the United States and his service to this country.

29. A like tribute, by way of the following poem, was offered by Councilman Sciarrotta:

"A TRIBUTE TO TRUMAN"

We have known of courage great and small  
Of men who dared lest we would fall;  
Men who dared to do the right  
And led us through the dark of night.

It takes great stamina and a lot of gall  
 To face the odds without a stall,  
 To make decisions and see them through  
 For Old Glory, the Red, the White, and Blue.

Sometimes one can't avoid the strife  
 That comes with each flame of life;  
 You cannot waver, yet save the day,  
 You'll just smother and then decay.

Leaders are made of sterner stuff,  
 They persevere and call each bluff  
 Until adversaries are brought to bay  
 And once again he's saved the day.

Today, we mourn a leader great  
 Who didn't waver and was never late  
 To call each play. He showed no fear  
 To save our land which we hold dear.

This man has left this earth of ours  
 But we cannot forget the hours  
 When clouds were heavy overhead,  
 He didn't give in but fought instead.

This fiery, scrappy little man,  
 No doubt a great American  
 Did all the things which his heart felt --  
 Just like a Teddy Roosevelt.

His courage, a symbol hard to forget,  
 Stayed with him until the hour of death.  
 I'm sure that history will reveal  
 His great courage and his great zeal."

30. Councilman Surber complimented all who worked on the Rose Parade Float, a prize winner -- the entire undertaking was most successful and a credit to the City of Torrance.

City Manager Ferraro noted that a detailed Staff report is presently being prepared regarding this event, for the information of the Council.

31. The recent report/address by City Manager Ferraro regarding police grants was deemed "excellent and very outstanding in every way" by Councilman Uerkwitz. It was Mr. Uerkwitz' request that the report be forwarded <sup>to</sup> proper authorities for their information -- there were no objections, and it was so ordered.

Added by Councilman Wilson was his feeling of pride in such a bold report -- a report which took stamina and courage on the part of Mr. Ferraro.

32. Action at the South Bay Councilmen's Association meeting to become involved in the Corridor Study was reported by Councilman Uerkwitz -- reports will be forthcoming to the Council on a regular basis.

33. Traffic Commission consideration of Eshelman/Cabrillo truck route, and review of apparent problems, was requested by Councilman Uerkwitz.

34. The status of presenting Charter revisions for the April ballot, per considerations of the Charter Review Committee, was questioned by Councilman Wilson. City Attorney Remelmeyer will report back in this matter.

35. The following prepared oral communication was presented by Councilman Wilson:

"On November 7th of last year, the voters of the State of California approved Proposition 20, the California Coastal Initiative. We are all aware of the events preceding and following that election.

"But I would like to reiterate them to put my remarks in the proper context. This Council by its majority vote supported the concepts of coastal conservation which were offered by Proposition 20.

"On the week following the general election, we again displayed our support, endorsing our Mayor, Ken Miller, for appointment to the Regional Commission. This endorsement was premised on the belief that Torrance, as a coastal city, and also as the third largest city in Los Angeles County, has already exercised responsible government in its actions regarding the use and development of our beaches and coastal areas. We felt that, through our Mayor, we could offer a broad base of experience and expertise.

"Shortly after our endorsement, we found that the City of Long Beach was also seeking endorsement for public and private members of their community. I am sure that you are all aware of the results of the various elections and appointments. And, you also know that we were not successful in our endeavors.

"I think that we have a greater responsibility to ensure that the Regional Commission works properly and that a workable program for the orderly development of our coastline comes to pass.

"Public involvement and awareness of the Commission's activities should be encouraged. Even though we are not represented on the Commission, we are still involved in at least two of the appointing organizations. And through these organizations, we can act and be heard.

"I would like to ask that the City Clerk be instructed to make the necessary arrangements to provide all members of this Council the agendas and minutes of the Regional Commission. In addition, I am anxious that we follow through on Mayor Miller's direction to Staff that we prepare our City for those exemptions and planning matters which we will need to submit to the Commission at an early date. Perhaps we could have a status report on this from Staff next week.

"Proposition 20 was the result of prolonged debate and extensive legislative consideration. With all of its faults, the people have mandated, and this program has been enacted into law. It must become

workable to ensure that we retain at least some of the local control given over to coastal commissions. If this fails to work properly, it can only be assumed that more stringent methods will be adopted, including more State control, and, therefore, less local autonomy.

"Just as a point of information, I would like to read to you the names of the appointments to the Los Angeles/Orange County Regional Coastal Commission:

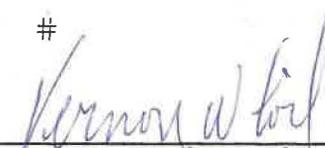
Mayor Miller reviewed the need for Proposition proponents to put forth an effort for representation -- everyone has something to lose or gain by Proposition 20.

36. The resignation of Airport Manager Egan was regretfully announced by City Manager Ferraro -- Mr. Egan is leaving the City to become a member of a pilot course at U.S.C. for Environmental Officers.

Mr. Egan confirmed the foregoing, and then described the challenging new career before him. The Mayor and Council expressed both their regrets at his departure, and their good wishes for his future success.

At 6:45 P.M. Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adjourn to Tuesday, January 9, 1973, at 6:00 P.M. The motion was seconded by Councilman Brewster, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable. Adjournment was to the memory of President Harry S. Truman.
