MINUTES OF AN ADJOURNED REGULAR
MEETING OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

OPENING CEREMONIES:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

The Torrance City Council convened in an Adjourned Regular Meeting on Tuesday, February 19, 1974, at 5:00 P.M. in the Council Chambers at Torrance City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Present: Councilmen Armstrong, Sciarrotta, Uerkwitz, Wilson, and Mayor Miller. Councilman Surber arrived at 5:20 P.M.; Councilman Brewster at 5:30 P.M.

Also present: City Manager Ferraro, City Attorney Remelmeyer, City Clerk Coil, and City Treasurer Rupert. Absent: Assistant City Manager Scharfman.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

Miss Shery Thompson led in the salute to the flag.

4. INVOCATION:

The invocation, as follows, was provided by Reverend George Johnson, Prairie Avenue Foursquare Church:

"OUR FATHER, WE THANK THEE AS WE CONVENE WITH THE BUSINESS OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, ASKING THY GUIDANCE AND WISDOM. THANK YOU FOR THE RIGHT OF DUE PROCESS OF LAW THAT EACH CITIZEN OF OUR COMMUNITY HAS; THANK YOU FOR THIS KIND OF GOVERNMENT THAT GIVES A RIGHT AND A VOICE TO THE PEOPLE OF ITS CITY. BE WITH US IN THIS SESSION; GUIDE THE POWERS THAT BE; BE WITH THE COUNCIL AND THE MAYOR, ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF, ALL THOSE THAT HAVE PART IN THE BUSINESS AT HAND."

STANDARD MOTIONS:

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved that the minutes of January 22, 1974 be approved as recorded. His motion was seconded by Councilman Uerkwitz, and approval was unanimous (Councilmen Brewster, Surber had not yet arrived at the meeting).

6. APPROVAL OF DEMANDS:

Councilman Uerkwitz moved that all regularly audited demands be paid. His motion, seconded by Councilman Wilson, was unanimously approved by roll call vote (Absent: Councilmen Brewster, Surber who had not yet arrived at the meeting.)

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7. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Uerkwitz moved that after the Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each Councilman the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and approval was unanimous. (Councilmen Brewster and Surber had not yet arrived at the meeting.)

8. COUNCIL COMMITTEE MEETINGS:Transportation Committee:

Councilman Uerkwitz, on behalf of Committee Chairman Surber, reported that this committee met on February 13th to review Airport rental policy in the light of the current economic situation. There were approximately 30 people in attendance; comments and suggestions were heard, with some referred to Staff for study and report, along with a request for a legal opinion from the City Attorney as to whether or not the City can adjust lease rents in any way. The Committee also requested that the Airport Commission provide more input on this item. Next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 6th at 5:00 P.M.

Finance Committee:

Next meeting on Monday, February 25th, at 5:30 P.M.

Civil Service Committee:

Met this past week re: retirement process and policy; report will be forthcoming.

COMMISSION MATTERS:9. Commission Interviews - Torrance Oil Board and Senior Citizens Council.

Charles Fulton was present to formally apply for appointment to the Senior Citizens Council.

At 5:15 P.M., Councilman Uerkwitz moved to recess for the purpose of a Personnel Session to consider Commission appointments. The motion was seconded by Councilman Armstrong, and approval was unanimous (Councilmen Brewster and Surber had not yet arrived at the meeting.)

STREETS AND SIDEWALKS:

11. GAS TAX FUNDS - Improvement of Del Amo Boulevard.

RECOMMENDATION OF CITY ENGINEER:

That \$15,000 in 2106 Gas Tax Funds be appropriated for the Improvement of Del Amo Boulevard from Madrona Avenue to Maple Avenue.

MOTION: Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur with the above recommendation of the City Engineer. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

REAL PROPERTY:

12. ROLLING HILLS SHOPPING CENTER, LEASE NO. 6.

RECOMMENDATION OF LAND MANAGEMENT TEAM:

(Remains as previously stated in December 13, 1973 communication):
That its position on the in-lieu rents be sustained, and if the Lessees do not agree to pay the in-lieu rents, that Lease No. 6 be terminated in accordance with the Council's previous directive, and the land offered for lease to the public.

City Manager Ferraro advised that a last minute counter offer had been received -- two weeks to analyze same was requested by Mr. Ferraro, concurrence with such delay having been expressed by Messrs. Levitt and Pope.

MOTION: Councilman Surber moved to continue Item #12 for two weeks. His motion was seconded by Councilman Armstrong, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

TRANSPORTATION:

13. RESOLUTION re: Hawthorne Boulevard Mini-Computer Signal System.

RESOLUTION NO. 74-28

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE

Councilman Wilson moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 74-28. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

LIBRARY OPERATIONS:14. EL RETIRO AND PARK PROJECT.RECOMMENDATION OF CITY LIBRARIAN:

That the El Retiro Library and Park Project should be bid at this time. Upon receipt of final bids, we shall return to this honorable body for authorization to fund the project from the 1967 Library Bond Fund and the Park and Recreation Facilities Fund.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S COMMENTS:

Staff's estimate of the cost of this project is \$112,000, but we concur in the concept of deferring specific appropriations until the receipt of construction bids. Monies are available in the Funds indicated.

MOTION: Councilman Armstrong moved to concur with the above recommendation of the City Librarian. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

Present on this item were Riviera Homeowners Association president, Robert S. White who noted the long standing interest of his group in this project and the financial arrangements therefor; and Library Commission Chairman Langford who confirmed this considerable interest of Riviera residents and groups in what is proposed.

Councilman Surber moved for the approval of Ordinance No. 2469 at its first reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

That Council adopt the retitled class specification of Police Officer with continued regular standing in the class for all incumbent Policemen.

MOTION: Councilman Uerkwitz moved to concur with the above recommendation. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

A special "thank you" to the Civil Service Commission for expediting this matter was expressed by Councilman Uerkwitz, on behalf of the Police, Fire, and Public Safety Committee.

Staff presentation was made by Sr. Environmental Officer Godfrey. Proponent presentation was furnished by Mr. A.Y. Olds, it being their request that two ground signs be permitted.

Discussion/regarding the overall signing program at the Gemco site; the specific needs of Exxon at this location; sign height considerations as to visibility, appearance, etc. It was the consensus of the Council that, in any event, only one sign should be permitted, it being ultimately agreed that it should be 10 ft. in height, per action reflected below:

Councilman Uerkwitz moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 74-30. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

A communication from Ms. Joan Smith re: reduced bus fares for over-21 college students was referred to Staff by Mayor Miller.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

30. The death of Assistant City Manager Scharfman's mother was regretfully reported by City Manager Ferraro -- funeral services were held this date, with rites to follow in New York City.

31. The new president of the Torrance Police Officers Association -- Officer Dennis Frandsen -- was introduced by Assistant to the City Manager Jackson.

32. Of historical note, per City Engineer Weaver, was the connection of the El Nido storm drain, thereby eliminating future drainage problems in this area.

33. City Attorney Remelmeyer advised that an Executive Session re: litigation would be necessary at the conclusion of this meeting.

34. Councilman Armstrong gifted Mayor Miller with an item dearly desired by him -- a copy of Louis Zamperini's autobiography "Devil at my Heels", autographed by the author. The Mayor was most appreciative of this collector's item, and deemed it most worthwhile reading.

35. Councilman Surber requested appropriate recognition for the Eagle Scout status achieved by John Bresnahan.

36. Investigation of any gasoline price-gouging practices in Torrance was requested by Councilman Surber, to the end that preventative legislation could be enacted.

37. Councilman Surber indicated his disfavor with recent legislation approving smoking areas for high school students -- hopefully, citizens with like objections will inform their legislators of their opposition to such an arrangement.

38. It was the request of Councilman Uerkwitz that Legislative Advocate Rupert provide a report on current legislation of interest to the Police, Fire, and Public Safety Committee.

39. Possible acquisition of the Fort MacArthur site at a future date by South Bay cities for use as a police training academy was suggested by Councilman Uerkwitz. City Manager Ferraro will follow through in this regard.

Noted by Mayor Miller was a communication from Congressman Glenn Anderson protesting the elimination of Fort MacArthur and requesting the views of the Council. It was the unanimous consensus of the Council that Fort MacArthur should be saved, if possible, and that a resolution reflecting this feeling be drawn up for Council adoption.

40. Mr. Steve Kent, 2861 West 234th Street, ASB President, Torrance High School, indicated his personal approval of having smoking rooms on campuses, in view of the deplorable conditions in the bathrooms created by unauthorized student smoking.

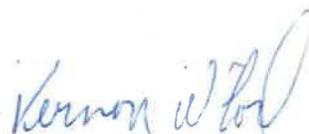
41. Councilman Surber requested that the City Attorney research the Charter to ascertain whether or not the School Board is in violation of same by way of their recent action approving money for each meeting.

At 6:45 P.M., Councilman Sciarrotta moved to recess for the purpose of an Executive Session to discuss pending litigation between the City and Don Wilson concerning title to certain sumps. City Attorney Remelmeyer confirmed that this is a proper subject for discussion. The motion was seconded by Councilman Armstrong, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

The Council returned at 7:30 P.M. No formal action was taken.
