MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING  
OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

OPENING CEREMONIES AND PRESENTATIONS:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

A regular meeting of the Torrance City Council was held at 5:30 p.m., on February 1, 1966, in the Council Chamber of City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Those responding to roll call by City Clerk Coil were: Councilmen Beasley, Miller, Olson, Sciarrotta, Vico, and Mayor Isen. Councilman Lyman was absent because of illness. City Manager Ferraro and City Attorney Remelmeyer were also in attendance.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

Several members of Civil Air Patrol Squadron 95 were present and, at the request of Mayor Isen, Tim Springer led the salute to our flag.

4. INVOCATION:

The Reverend Wallis Kornegay of First Church of the Nazarene opened the meeting with an invocation. Mayor Isen related the various civic interests of Reverend Kornegay who has been Lieutenant Governor of the Kiwanis Club in two states, Texas and Missouri.

5. PRESENTATION OF PERMA PLAQUE TO ELMER S. "RED" MOON:

Mayor Isen recalled the recent retirement dinner for Red Moon and at his request, Councilman Miller presented a perma plaque resolution in recognition of his twenty years' service to the City in the Recreation Department.

STANDARD MOTIONS:

6. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to approve the minutes of the regular meeting held January 25, 1966 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Vico, carried, there being no objections.

7. APPROVAL OF DEMANDS:

Councilman Beasley moved all bills regularly audited be paid. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta and carried as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Beasley, Miller, Olson, Sciarrotta,  
Vico, and Mayor Isen.

NOES: COUNCILMEN: None

ABSENT: COUNCILMEN: Lyman.

8. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved that after the Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each councilman the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The motion was seconded by Councilman Vico and carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

City Clerk Coil called attention to the decorative cover on the agenda. Starting with this month, the designs will be created by the Recreation Department and Mrs. Erika Muhl who will be responsible was introduced from the audience.

Mayor Isen gave an explanation of Council procedure for the benefit of new members of the audience.

HEARINGS:

9. VACATION OF PORTIONS OF KENT AVENUE, LOMITA BOULEVARD, 230th STREET 230TH PLACE AND 231st STREET. Formal hearing on Resolution No. 66-7 of intention to vacate. It was noted that the resolution ordering the vacation will be presented concurrently with the Final Tract Map No. 30376 and all improvements bonds pertinent.

Affidavit of Publication was presented by City Clerk Coil and, there being no objection, ordered filed.

Mayor Isen inquired if anyone wished to be heard on this matter and no one appearing, on motion of Councilman Sciarrotta, seconded by Councilman Vico, the hearing was ordered closed, there being no objection.

City Manager Ferraro stated the resolution will be prepared by the Engineering Department, contingent on presentation of the Final Tract Map as stated in the second paragraph of City Engineer Nollac's transmittal letter.

Councilman Beasley moved to concur in the recommendation of the City Engineer and City Manager. His motion was seconded by Councilman Miller and carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

PLANNING AND ZONING MATTERS:

10. TENTATIVE TRACT NO. 25380, SUBDIVIDER, DAN BUTCHER; ENGINEER, LANCO ENGINEERING. The location is the northwest corner of Walnut Street and 238th Street, containing eight lots, zoned R-1.

Mayor Isen commented that this has been recommended for denial, but perhaps it should go to the Council Committee for consideration. He asked Mr. Butcher if this would be agreeable and Mr. Butcher assented. Councilman Beasley moved the item be referred to a councilmanic committee for return to the Council in thirty days. Councilman Sciarrotta seconded the motion to which Mr. Butcher agreed. There was no objection.

Mayor Isen named as a committee Councilmen Miller, Vico and Sciarrotta.

11. EMERGENCY ORDINANCE AND REGULAR ORDINANCE prohibiting issuance of building permits for construction of any dwelling unit on certain property along Anza Avenue.

Superintendent of Building and Safety McKinnon noted an error in the two ordinances proposed: In the title and at any place where the Tract number is designated as "26511" must be changed to "26551".

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title (correctly designating the Tract numbered 26551) to:

ORDINANCE NO. 1657

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE PROHIBITING THE ISSUANCE OF ANY BUILDING PERMIT FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF ANY DWELLING UNIT ON LOTS 132 THROUGH 150, 157 THROUGH 170 and 191 AND 192 OF TRACT 25788 AND LOTS 91 THROUGH 97 OF TRACT 26551 AND DECLARING THE PRESENCE OF AN EMERGENCY.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to waive further reading of emergency ordinance No. 1657 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Olson, carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1657 as an emergency ordinance at this, its only reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Miller and carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number to and read title to: (properly designating the Tract No. 26551)

ORDINANCE NO. 1658

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE PROHIBITING THE ISSUANCE OF ANY BUILDING PERMIT FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF ANY DWELLING UNIT ON LOTS 132 THROUGH 150, 157 THROUGH 170, AND 191 AND 192 OF TRACT 25788 AND LOTS 91 THROUGH 97 OF TRACT 26551.

Councilman Miller moved to waive further reading of Ordinance No. 1658 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

Councilman Miller moved to approve Ordinance No. 1658 at its first reading and his motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

12. *Juanita Planning Commission* *Hester Dale*  
 ZC65-52, ~~HESTER DALE~~ - CHANGE OF ZONE - PETITION FOR REHEARING AND RECONSIDERATION. Letter from Hitchcock and Bowman, Attorneys for Mrs. Dale re petition for rehearing and reconsideration, with comments from City Attorney.

Mayor Isen asked if anyone wished to speak on this matter and there was no response. Councilman Sciarrotta moved to deny the petition for rehearing and reconsideration. His motion was seconded by Councilman Olson and carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

SEWERS AND DRAINAGE:

13. AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF SANITARY SEWERS IN 190TH STREET EASTERLY OF VAN NESS AVENUE (B66-8). Recommendation of City Engineer/Street Superintendent, with concurrence of City Manager that contract be awarded to Beecher Construction Co. at \$15,133.40.

Councilman Beasley moved to accept the bid as recommended and reject all others. His motion was seconded by Councilman Miller. Roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Councilman Lyman absent).

14. AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR INSTALLATION OF STORM DRAIN IN AMSLER STREET AT DORMONT AVENUE (B66-5). Recommendation of City Engineer/Street Superintendent, with concurrence of City Manager that contract be awarded to Kohler Construction, Inc. at \$1,720.90.

Councilman Beasley moved to accept the bid as recommended and reject all others. His motion was seconded by Councilman Vico and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Councilman Lyman absent).

BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES, AND SIGNS:

15. EXTENSION OF TIME ON TEMPORARY BILLBOARDS: Recommendation of Superintendent of Building and Safety, with concurrence of City Manager, that request of B&L Outdoor Advertising for extensions of time for temporary signs to remain, be approved.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to grant the requested extension of time and his motion, seconded by Councilman Vico, carried, there being no objection.

PERSONNEL MATTERS:

16. PROPOSED ORDINANCE amending Rule XXI of "Rules and Regulations Supplementing the Personnel Ordinance No. 326" providing for a classification plan and amendments thereto.

Mayor Isen commented that this is a matter to be referred to the Civil Service Commission and City Attorney Remelmeyer confirmed his information. Councilman Beasley so moved and Councilman Olson seconded. There was no objection.

FISCAL MATTERS:

17. ACCOUNTING AND AUDITING SERVICES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1965-66. Letter from Cotton & Francisco, Accountants and Auditors, re accounting and auditing services, with comments of the City Manager.

No actual recommendation was made by the City Manager because this is a matter in which the auditor acts on behalf of and reports directly to the City Council. Councilman Sciarrotta moved to retain Cotton and Francisco as outlined in their letter and his motion was seconded by Councilman Vico. Roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Councilman Lyman absent).

18. CLAIM OF MR. AND MRS. LEVANE FORSYTHE VS. CITY OF TORRANCE for damages to their property on November 19, 1965, when improperly drained surface water in the area was drained onto claimants' property.

Councilman Beasley moved to deny and refer the claim to the Legal Department. Councilman Vico seconded.

Attorney William Mac Cabe of 18039 Crenshaw Boulevard urged that the Forsythes' claim be honored. Mayor Isen explained to him the manner in which claims are processed and stated that denial is preliminary to any filing of a lawsuit. Any negotiation for compromise can be carried on.

The motion to deny and refer carried, there being no objection.

19. EXPENDITURES OF OVER \$300.00.

1. \$366.77 to Hersey-Sparling Meter Company for one only 2" Hersey Model CT meter with bronze case with check valves on intermediate and main flows, to agree with Torrance specifications.

2. \$414.18 to Prismo Safety Corporation for twenty-five 9-unit reflectors (18 x 18), thirty 12 x 18 NO STOPPING ANYTIME signs and thirty DIP signs.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur in approval of the two above listed expenditures. His motion was seconded by Councilman Olson and carried as follows:

AIRPORT MATTERS:

20. KATHRYN CALDWELL'S REQUEST FOR CANCELLATION OF HER FLOWER STAND LEASE and return of performance bond and rent guarantee deposit. Recommendation of Airport Commission President to approve cancellation of lease, return of rental deposit of \$150 (except for \$25.00 service fee) and return of \$1,000 performance bond.

Councilman Miller moved to concur in all phases of the recommendation and his motion, seconded by Councilman Miller, carried by the following roll call vote:

Sciarrotta, Vico, Mayor Isen.

NOES: COUNCILMEN: None

ABSENT: COUNCILMEN: Lyman.

21. REQUEST FROM CIVIL AIR PATROL TORRANCE CADET SQUADRON 95 FOR DONATION OF LAND FOR THEIR USE. The recommendation of the Airport Commission is to designate T hangar T-13 for their temporary use with an effort to find a permanent home for them on the Airport.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur in the recommendation and his motion, seconded by Councilman Beasley, carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

Several of the Civil Air Patrol members were present with their leader and were introduced to the meeting. On behalf of those members, Cadet Springer acknowledged the recognition and offered any help they may be able to give the City.

22. PROPOSAL FOR STUDY PLAN FOR TERMINAL/NIKE AREA AND TEMPORARY FREEZE PERIOD. Submitted by Airport Commission President.

Councilman Olson moved that this item be referred to the Airport Committee of the Council. His motion was seconded by Councilman Miller and carried, there being no objection.

23. REQUEST FOR PERMA PLAQUE RESOLUTION FOR WILLIAM J. CRITCHFIELD ASSISTANT AIRPORT MANAGER.

Councilman Sciarrotta said some kind of uniform policy should be set on awarding perma plaque resolutions to employees who leave the City's employment; however, Mayor Isen believed it should be a separate decision on the merits of each.

Councilman Beasley moved to prepare and place in perma plaque format such a resolution in recognition of the services of Mr. Critchfield and his motion was seconded by Councilman Miller.

Roll call vote was:

Councilman Beasley moved to recess the Council meeting in order to hold the meeting of the Redevelopment Agency of the City of Torrance. Councilman Vico seconded and there was no objection. The Council reconvened as such at 6:05 p.m.

BUS SYSTEM:24. THE REPORT OF BUS SUPERINTENDENT RE TRIP TO ROSE PARADE.

Mayor Isen said if there was no objection, this informational item would be ordered filed. There was no objection.

FIRE OPERATIONS:25. REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF WORKING DRAWINGS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR FIRE STATION NO. 5. The request is from Chief Benner for completion of working drawings and specifications by Adams, Latham, Kripp & Wright.

City Manager Ferraro asked that if the Council does favorably consider this request, if it would be with the provision that approval be subject to the City Attorney's review because of some organizational changes in the firm.

Mayor Isen moved to concur in approval subject to Mr. Ferraro's request and his motion, seconded by Councilman Beasley, carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

COMMUNITY AFFAIRS:26. RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING MAGNAVOX RESEARCH LABORATORIES.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 66-18

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING THE MAGNAVOX RESEARCH LABORATORIES ON THEIR CONTRIBUTION TO THE COMMUNITY AND THEIR CONTINUED GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Resolution No. 66-18 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Olson, carried by unanimous roll call vote of those present (Councilman Lyman was absent).

Mayor Isen asked that the resolution be back for Councilman Lyman's vote next week and also moved that it be prepared in perma plaque form. Councilman Sciarrotta seconded and roll call vote was:

Dr. Thorsen, Technical Director of Magnavox, briefly described the expansion and development of the Torrance plant and introduced the Personnel Manager, Robert German, and the General Manager, Lou Justice.

A recess was declared at about 6:15 and the Council returned to its deliberations at 6:25 p.m. all members being present who were present at the time of roll call (Councilman Lyman absent).

ELECTION MATTERS:27. RESOLUTION prohibiting the exposure of female breasts for April ballot.

The version of this resolution printed on pink paper was the one considered, a correction having been made in the title, and a further

amendment was made by City Attorney Remelmeyer to the pink draft - to add the words "more restrictive" in the next to last line of Sec. 6. between the words "adopting" and "ordinances" - to cause the last sentence to read: "The adoption of this section shall not preclude the city council from adopting more restrictive ordinances further regulating the aforesaid subject matter."

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 66-19

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE PLACING ON THE BALLOT AT THE GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE HELD APRIL 12, 1966, AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XIX OF THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE BY ADDING SECTION 6 THERETO PROHIBITING THE EXPOSURE OF FEMALE BREASTS.

Mayor Isen introduced the resolution and moved its adoption by the City Council. Councilman Sciarrotta seconded.

Mayor Isen read an editorial from a metropolitan newspaper of February 21, 1965 which indicated there was a change in the public moral climate and the fact that the force of public opinion is often much stronger than legislation. He mentioned various phases of this problem which exist in Torrance's area and the importance of establishing the wishes of the people. By vote the people could declare what is, or is not an outrage of public decency in their opinion and as the State Assembly must ratify all charter amendments, it will not be possible for the legislature to ignore the action.

Roll call vote on Resolution No. 66-19 was unanimously favorable (Councilman Lyman absent).

28. RESOLUTION placing on the ballot at the General Municipal Election to be held April 12, 1966, an amendment to the Charter of the City repealing Section 2 and 3 of Article VII, Section 3 of Article VIII, Section 4 of Article IX, Section 1 of Article XVI and Section 1 of Article XVII.

Mrs. W. F. Barnes of 23426 Susana Avenue, representing the League of Women Voters, said the general intent of the league was for a general charter review, with certain areas mentioned for specific attention. She said the League feels that City Attorney Remelmeyer's recommendation to delay is proper. Councilman Sciarrotta so moved and Mayor Isen seconded. The motion carried, there being no objection. The matter is referred to the committee for study at the proper time.

ITEMS NOT OTHERWISE CLASSIFIED:

SECOND READING OF ORDINANCES:

30. NO. 1654.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for second reading, and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 1654

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING APPENDIX I OF "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954" TO RECLASSIFY THAT CERTAIN PROPERTY WHICH IS LOCATED AT 2657 DALEMEAD AVENUE, SOUTHERLY OF THE INTERSECTION OF PACIFIC COAST HIGHWAY AND CRENSHAW BOULEVARD AND DESCRIBED IN ZONE CHANGE NO. 65-23. (Campbell, Lowe & Williams, applicants.)

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1654 at its second and final reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Vico and carried as follows:

31. ORDINANCE NO. 1656.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for second reading, and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 1656

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING APPENDIX I OF "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954" TO RECLASSIFY THAT CERTAIN PROPERTY LOCATED ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF NEWTON STREET APPROXIMATELY MIDWAY BETWEEN PARK STREET AND MADISON STREET AND DESCRIBED IN ZC 65-53. (Walteria Community Church, applicant)

Councilman Beasley moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1656 at its second and final reading and his motion, seconded by Councilman Miller carried by unanimous roll call vote (Councilman Lyman absent).

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

32. City Attorney Remelmeyer said that David Cleveland of the Building Department had reported that as of today, February 1st, 1966, all the dairy herds have left the City with the exception of the herd at the Quinn Dairy.

33. City Clerk Coil called to the attention of the Council the fact that because February 22 is a holiday, there should be adjournment from the February 15th meeting to March 1, 1966, at 5:30. Mayor Isen so moved and Councilman Sciarrotta seconded; there was no objection.

34. Miss Deanna Manning of the Recreation Department introduced Robert Jorgenson who is Senior Supervisor replacing Red Moon and assuming all those responsibilities, as well as many others.

35. Councilman Beasley said he had received a telephone call from Jerry Russell, State Division of Highways, saying permits have been issued for street work and signalization of Del Amo Boulevard connecting with Hawthorne Boulevard, as well as Lomita and Hawthorne.

36. Councilman Beasley expressed disapproval of the manner of carrying out the contract for salary and classification survey by J. L. Jacobs of Chicago. He had expected a report from the survey team by December 1st and said it is not yet available and the councilmen have not been properly informed.

Mayor Isen and City Manager Ferraro outlined the procedures which have been taken and those will be necessary with respect to this survey. The employees' rights are not being violated and any increases which may result from the survey will be retroactive to January 1, 1966. A number of meetings have been held in a regular fashion and the survey is progressing in an orderly manner, in respect to this important and difficult project.

37. Councilman Beasley has noticed an inordinate number of "beer joints" in downtown Torrance, he said, with rowdy, low-class patronage, and many fringe disadvantages. He asked if there is not some method of stopping this condition. Councilman Miller mentioned the ordinance which would require conditional use permits of new business of this type, but would not affect established businesses.

Police Chief Koenig agreed it is an area which should be of great concern to the citizens. A beer bar is a legitimate business but there is danger in a situation where operators transfer their license rather than surrender it, and move into a low rental district even at a loss for a time, in order to keep their license active. It is easier to sell with an operative license than otherwise. It is well to be aware of this situation which becomes the nucleus for a local skid row. However, there is no reason for the Police Department to protest the issuance of a license without definite grounds, such as a criminal record. Thus, it becomes the responsibility of the community and the citizens.

City Manager Ferraro listed the various means which have been taken to control the operation of such establishments - there are now good regulations as to new businesses and the problem becomes the old ones. If citizens, unrelated to City government, would protest, this would be a great help, and more effective with the ABC than Torrance Police Department protests.

In this general connection, Mayor Isen asked that a letter on behalf of the Council be written to ABC about the beer bar adjacent to Walteria Park which has been mentioned at a previous Council meeting.

38. Councilman Olson reminded all of the Boy Scouts Parade Saturday morning at 10:30, and asked to be excused from the balance of the meeting to attend to details of that parade.

39. Councilman Sciarrotta said he had had a complaint of stagnant water near the apartments at 23122 Samuel Street and the mosquito nuisance. The City Manager took note.

40. Councilman Sciarrotta read a written statement calling for return of home rule to the cities and presented a resolution to the City Clerk with the request that it receive a number and be read for action of the Council. He so moved and Councilman Vico seconded his motion. There was no objection.

RESOLUTION NO. 66-20

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE REQUESTING THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA TO ADOPT A STATUTE OR TO PLACE ON THE BALLOT A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO CLARIFY THE PREEMPTION PROBLEM AND RESTORE HOME RULE TO CITIES.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Resolution No. 66-20 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Vico, carried by unanimous roll call vote of those remaining in the meeting (Councilmen Lyman and Olson absent). It will be back for consideration by the whole Council next week.

Mayor Isen praised the resolution as being comparable and compatible to the one he introduced under Item 27 of this agenda and Mr. J. W. Judd, President of the Southwood Riviera Homeowners Association concurred on behalf of his membership.

Councilman Sciarrotta said he would follow through on the resolution, attend League meetings and send out letters in an attempt to restore home rule.

41. Councilman Vico asked about the survey to evaluate the property on the Airport with respect to an automobile dealer who is interested in negotiation for a lease. City Manager Ferraro explained this is the reason the matter was referred to the Airport Committee this evening. The Airport Commission has recommended a freeze.

There being no further oral communications, the meeting was adjourned at 7:30 p.m.
