MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING
OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

OPENING CEREMONIES AND PRESENTATIONS:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

A regular meeting of the Torrance City Council was held at 5:30 p.m., on February 15, 1966, in the Council Chamber of City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Those responding to roll call by City Clerk Coil were: Councilmen Beasley, Lyman, Miller, Olson, Sciarrotta, Vico, and Mayor Isen. Absent: None. City Attorney Remelmeyer and City Manager Ferraro were also present.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

At the request of Mayor Isen, Mike Hoover, a District executive of the Boy Scouts, led the salute to our flag.

4. INVOCATION:

Reverend R. Wallis Kornegay of the First Church of the Nazarene, Minister of the Month, opened the meeting with an invocation of divine guidance and Mayor Isen presented to him his certificate for having acted in this capacity during the month of February.

5. PRESENTATION OF PERMA PLAQUE RESOLUTION TO MONTE CATTERLIN.

Several members of the South Bay Bar Association were present, as well as Monte Catterlin and Doris Hamilton, and Mayor Isen, Councilman Sciarrotta and the President of the South Bay Bar Association, Fred Benson, joined City Attorney Remelmeyer in presentation of a perma plaque resolution and good wishes to Monte and Doris in their marriage and future home in Hawaii.

Mayor Isen recognized a group of seventh and eighth grade students in the audience, from Ascension Lutheran School with their instructor, Mr. Ahlers.

With reference to the presentation of perma plaque resolution to Magnavox Research Laboratories, Mayor Isen announced there will be a ceremony at the plant lobby on Thursday, February 24, 1966, at 11:30 a.m., followed by lunch, as guests of Magnavox. Members of the City Council, the City Manager, or his Assistant, Mr. Scharfman, the City Clerk and the City Treasurer are invited. City Manager Ferraro will be out of the city at that time.

STANDARD MOTIONS:

6. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Because of the holiday Friday, February 11th, the minutes of the meeting held February 8th will be held until the next meeting for approval.

7. APPROVAL OF DEMANDS:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved all demands which have been regularly audited, be paid and his motion, seconded by Councilman Beasley, carried as follows:

8. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Beasley moved that after the Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each councilman the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The motion was seconded by Councilman Vico and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

PLANNING AND ZONING MATTERS:9. TENTATIVE TRACT NO. 25024, 45 LOTS ZONED C-3, SUBDIVIDER, DEL AMO PROPERTY: ENGINEERS, DEVELOPMENT CONSULTANTS INC.

Mr. Leonard Gerkin of Development Consultants, Inc. said this tract has been carefully studied by his firm and City Staff and the Planning Commissions and the recommendations of that Commission, as approved, are quite satisfactory.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to close the hearing and his motion was seconded by Councilman Beasley. There was no objection.

Councilman Beasley questioned the deletion of the requirement that the Torrance Municipal Water Department provide water service to the tract, even with the understanding that everything possible will be done to accommodate the City of Torrance. City Manager Ferraro stated Del Amo Properties has some problems with Dominguez Water Corporation as to easements and it is difficult at this stage, because of the new state law, to indicate whether legally the City of Torrance Water Department can serve the tract. Mayor Isen said this is a minor problem; the City is predominantly interested in the financial center being developed and he advised a little latitude in Management and Engineering to this end although it is proper for these problems to be pinpointed. City Manager Ferraro said the sentence which Mayor Isen has mentioned was a last minute addition and he assumed the responsibility.

Mayor Isen moved to concur in the recommendation and conditions set forth by the Planning Commission. Councilman Miller seconded. Councilman Beasley asked that one change be made: that if legally possible the tract be served by Torrance Water Department and at the suggestion of City Attorney Remel-meyer, Mr. Massey, the attorney, explained the legal easement complication and said the Council's policy on servicing the tract, in connection with the recording of the tentative tract map will be detrimental and could delay the whole project. Under these circumstances, Councilman Beasley withdrew his objection and roll call vote on approval of the Planning Commission's recommendations and conditions, was unanimously favorable.

Mr. Massey promised every possible cooperation with the Water Department.

STREETS AND SIDEWALKS:

10. COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS WITH STATE DIVISION OF HIGHWAYS FOR IMPROVEMENT OF (1) Hawthorne Boulevard, east side, south of 190th Street; and (2) Hawthorne Boulevard, west side, north of 236th Street. Resolutions attached.

Councilman Beasley moved to approve Ordinance No. 1663 at its first reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Miller and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

FISCAL MATTERS:

15. Claim of Maryland Casualty Company vs. City of Torrance Municipal Water Department for their insured Gilbert D. Sellan in regard to damages suffered on December 24, 1965.

16. Claim of Clorinda A. Pabon et al vs. City of Torrance for personal injuries and wrongful death resulting from a vehicle and train accident at Arlington and Lincoln Streets in Torrance on November 1, 1965, in which Fausto H. Pabon died.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE IN MEMORIAM TO SAM LEVY, AN OUTSTANDING PIONEER CITIZEN OF THIS COMMUNITY WHO EXEMPLIFIED THE HIGHEST QUALITIES OF CITIZENSHIP AND MANHOOD.

Councilman Miller moved to adopt Resolution No. 66-24 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Olson, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

ITEMS NOT OTHERWISE CLASSIFIED:

23. RELEASE OF SUBDIVISION BOND - TRACT NO. 29141 (SUBDIVIDER: PALOS VERDES DEVELOPERS) Bond No. 0214-64. Recommendation of City Engineer/Street Superintendent, with concurrence of City Manager, to release.

Councilman Beasley moved to concur in the recommendation stated and his motion, seconded by Mayor Isen, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

24. CATERING TRUCK DEPOSITS: Proposed Ordinance.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 1664

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING SECTION 36.6 OF "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954" TO PROVIDE FOR AN ADDITIONAL COLLECTION OF FUNDS FROM OPERATORS OF RETAIL ROUTES WITHIN THE CITY TO BE USED AS A DEPOSIT AGAINST UNPAID CIGARETTE TAXES.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to approve Ordinance No. 1664 at its first reading and his motion, seconded by Councilman Lyman, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

25. FIREWORKS STANDS: Proposed Ordinance.

Councilman Beasley moved to refer this proposed ordinance

to a Committee appointed by the Mayor and Councilman Miller seconded the motion.

Councilman Sciarrotta questioned whether or not the reports actually are necessary. Mayor Isen will appoint a committee. There was no objection and the motion carried.

26. AMENDMENT TO OIL CODE - CHAPTER 19 OF THE CITY CODE.
Proposed Ordinance.

Mayor Isen believed there is more work to be done on this ordinance but City Manager Ferraro requested that its first reading be had at this time, and the second reading be delayed to allow the City Attorney time to investigate.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 1665

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING ARTICLE IV OF CHAPTER 19 OF "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954" REGULATING THE PRODUCTION OF OIL AND GAS; PROVIDING FOR COMBINING OIL DISTRICTS AND ESTABLISHING DRILLING REGULATIONS THEREFOR; AND ESTABLISHING STANDARD CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL WELLS, WELL SITES AND DRILL SITES WITHIN THE CITY OF TORRANCE.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to approve Ordinance No. 1665 at first reading and Councilman Beasley seconded. Roll call vote was unanimously favorable, except for Mayor Isen who abstained because he had agreed with the suggestion of the City Attorney to study the ordinance further. He stated a motion to table the second reading for a time would be in order and Councilman Sciarrotta moved to hold the second reading in abeyance until after thirty days. Mayor Isen seconded and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

27. AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR IMPROVEMENT OF 190th STREET FROM CRENSHAW BOULEVARD TO VAN NESS AVENUE.

City Manager Ferraro asked that this item be withdrawn from the agenda as it was already approved February 8, 1966. There was no objection.

28. YWCA LEASE. Proposed Resolution.

Mrs. Clara Conner, President of the YWCA was present and asked consideration of the longer term lease, if possible and Councilman Sciarrotta moved that the version printed on pink paper be considered. Mayor Isen seconded and there was no objection.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 66-29

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE AND ATTEST THAT CERTAIN LEASE DATED MARCH 1, 1966 BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF TORRANCE AND THE YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION OF TORRANCE.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Resolution No. 66-29 and his motion, seconded by Mayor Isen, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

On motion of Councilman Miller, seconded by Councilman Vico, a recess was declared for the purpose of conducting the business of the Torrance Redevelopment Agency. The Council returned to its agenda at 6:25.

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29. PROPOSED ORDINANCE RE OFF STREET PARKING.

City Manager Ferraro asked that this item be withdrawn from the agenda. There was no objection.

Mayor Isen asked about the practice of republishing the entire content of an ordinance in case of amendment and protested the cost to the City. City Attorney Remelmeyer assured him this is done only when the entire ordinance has been revamped, as in this case.

SECOND READING OF ORDINANCE:

30. ORDINANCE NO. 1660.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for its second reading, and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 1660

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING SUBSECTION H OF SECTION 20 OF APPENDIX I OF "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954" IN ORDER TO PROVIDE DEVELOPMENTAL STANDARDS FOR BUSINESSES SERVING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES.

Councilman Beasley moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1660 at its second and final reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

ADDENDA ITEMS:

31. City Clerk Coil announced two claims had been received, one from Marven Elzea and

32. Another claim, by Charles M. LeVa, concerning the same incident as that covered in Item 31, above.

As to both Items 31 and 32, Councilman Sciarrotta moved to deny and refer to the City Attorney. Councilman Lyman seconded and there was no objection.

33. PROCLAMATION:

Mayor Isen proclaimed the week of February 20 - 26, 1966 as NATIONAL ENGINEERS WEEK.

34. City Manager Ferraro stated there is to be an administrative meeting in Sacramento on matters pertaining to the proposed South Bay College at 10 a.m., on March 1st and asked Council authorization for proper representation from its members. Councilman Beasley moved that whichever councilmen can attend be authorized

to do so, with appropriate expenses for round trip transportation and one day. Mayor Isen seconded and roll call vote was:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Beasley, Lyman, Miller, Olson,
Sciarrotta, Vico, and Mayor Isen.

NOES: COUNCILMEN: None.

Mayor Isen said, too, had a telephone conversation with Assemblyman Thomas on this subject. Mayor Isen said the Torrance people have not given up the idea of having this college here and that oil should not be any criterion because Dominguez faces the same problem. He hopes Assemblyman Thomas will again concentrate on Torrance's original site as long as it remains undeveloped. The San Pedro people are anxious to have Friendship Park chosen. Mayor Isen said some research should be made as to whether Dominguez really needs a college at this time, or for a long time into the future. When Assemblyman Thomas first fought for the original site, it was a part of his district which it is no longer. There are many appropriate matters to discuss at this Sacramento meeting.

Councilman Sciarrotta said he had been given the impression that Torrance could obtain the college if it would donate about half the necessary land.

Councilman Vico thinks the college for Torrance is a lost cause and he believes the City has taken enough property off the tax rolls and further effort along this line is a waste of money.

Councilman Beasley said there are rumors that another site, closer to Torrance than either Friendship Park or Dominguez, is being considered.

35. City Manager Ferraro mentioned the request of Harvey Aluminum through Thomas Lecher, for removal of certain trees near their property line on the west side of Western Avenue. They have agreed to remove nine trees and replace them (nine in lieu of those removed and 27 more in line with Council policy). Arrangements have been made for the permit and the company also has agreed to repair any sidewalks damaged by the removal and to pay the entire cost in connection with the removal, exchange and furnishing of the extra trees. Councilman Lyman moved to approve this arrangement; Councilman Vico seconded and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

36. Mr. Vico asked for a similar arrangement on behalf of Dominguez Water Corporation as to some trees near Save-Co. Mayor Isen suggested he talk with the City Manager about it and said if there was no objection, his request would be referred to the City Manager. There was no objection.

37. City Manager Ferraro asked for direction with respect to the ordinance pertaining to conditional use permits for beer bars. At the time the emergency ordinance allowing for appeal was effected, there was a conditional use permit in process for 2168-2170 Torrance Boulevard in Zone C-1, CUP 66-3. The Planning Commission placed conditions that (1) adequate parking must be provided, and (2) that the application be for ten years and (3) that the ABC license No. 40 limited to a bona fide restaurant be obtained rather than No. 39. The application has been pending since January 19th. The matter has not been appealed and Mayor Isen felt it is not before the Council.

38. City Engineer/Street Superintendent Nollac called attention to Item D of Informational items and commended the Traffic Engineer, Arthur Horkay, on a fine professional job with respect to the intersection of Hawthorne and Torrance Boulevards.

39. City Treasurer Rupert called attention to the additional savings shown by Information Item E.

40. Park Superintendent Clemmer suggested that in that the park area around the YWCA has never had a name, that it be called SAM LEVY PARK. Councilman Miller thereupon so moved and his motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

Mayor Isen suggested that an appropriate bronze plaque be prepared for placement on a permanent tree in the park and Councilman Miller so moved. Councilman Lyman seconded. Roll call vote was:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Beasley, Lyman, Miller, Olson,
Sciarrotta, Vico, and Mayor Isen.

NOES: COUNCILMEN: None.

41. Councilman Lyman reported a call from a Mr. Wise of 16516 Atkinson Avenue whose problem has not been solved. He has suggested to Mr. Wise that he present it in writing for the Council agenda on March 8th, 1966, an eight o'clock meeting.

42. Councilman Sciarrotta would like to have a meeting of the Finance Committee of the Council on February 21, 1966 at 9:30 a.m., a Monday, with Management present, on a matter having to do with the Police organization.

43. Mayor Isen spoke further on the intersection of Torrance Boulevard and Hawthorne. The Division of Highways does not seem to think a left turn directional signal is necessary. Councilman Beasley thought it should be taken up with Mr. Telford. Mr. Nollac said he believes results will be forthcoming soon.

44. Mayor Isen read in full a letter addressed to the Fire Chief from Walter R. Bell, Fire Chief of New Rochelle, New York, copies of which were sent to the Mayor and the City Manager. Chief Bell's daughter and her family had been involved in an automobile accident and Torrance firemen were very helpful in the emergency. He expressed appreciation.

45. Mayor Isen mentioned numerous complaints which have been received regarding the Torrance Telephone Directory recently distributed by a group from the YMCA. This directory, Mayor Isen said, has a degree of authenticity and initially would seem to have come from the telephone company. It does not. Also, it would seem to be under City auspices; there are Chamber of Commerce ads; the name of the publisher is not set forth although a telephone number is given. However, the principal objection or criticism is that there is not a single listing of Hollywood-Riviera telephone numbers. He regretted that this particular publication had been brought out or sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. He suggested in the future some sort of license be required and that the pub-

lisher let the City know what they purport to cover.

City Manager Ferraro said if there was no objection, his office would investigate this matter and Mayor Isen moved that such investigation be implemented. Councilman Beasley seconded and there was no objection.

46. Mr. John Judd, President of Southwood Riviera Homeowners Association, raised a question regarding the Airport and asked the status of a report which he had expected. Mayor Isen asked Airport Manager Egan, but Mr. Egan said he would have to check into the matter. Councilman Lyman suggested that Mr. Judd put these requests in writing so the Council would be advised of the subject matter.

Mr. Judd said what he is requesting is a date for hearing the Association's complaint against the Airport and objected to being "bounced between the FAA and the Airport Manager".

Mayor Isen admonished Mr. Judd to present his complaint in an orderly manner to the Airport Committee of the Council. Chairman Olson of the Committee said a meeting would be held at any time that the members of the Committee are conversant with the subject. Mr. Judd will be advised of that time.

47. Mr. Robert Stark, representing Ideal Weighing Machine Co., protested the increase in license fees for weighing machines within the City from \$1 to \$2 per machine. His company has nine. The margin, he said, is very small. Los Angeles charges \$1.60 per thousand dollars of gross. There is also the problem of machines in places such as Thrifty Drug Store with comparatively larger patronage in relation to machines in small independent stores. There has been no increase in the cost of being weighed; it is still one penny.

Mayor Isen told Mr. Stark the matter will be investigated and the results mailed to him. If they are not to his liking, he may appear before Council again. City Manager Ferraro said a report will be made by March 1st.

Councilman Lyman reminded the Council of the very small amount involved and the cost of even the investigation which has been suggested. He moved that the City cut the fee back to \$1.00 per year per weighing machine and Councilman Vico seconded. Roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

City Manager Ferraro did not approve of the action, saying it has not been Council's policy to act strictly from a monetary standpoint on a matter of principle.

48. Councilman Olson wanted to point out that the Dragons Club of the YMCA had distributed the phone books mentioned earlier in this meeting and were using what they collected toward the YMCA building. He did not want any aspersion cast on their activity and Mayor Isen assured him his comments were directly and exclusively toward the publishers.

On motion of Councilman Sciarrotta, seconded by Councilman Lyman, the meeting was adjourned to March 1, 1966 at 5:30 p.m. by unanimous roll call vote. The next regularly scheduled date on which Council would ordinarily meet is Washington's Birthday and a holiday.
