MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING
OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

OPENING CEREMONIES:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

The Torrance City Council convened in a regular meeting on Tuesday, November 4, 1969, at 5:30 P.M. in the Council Chambers at Torrance City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Responding to roll call by City Clerk Coil were: Councilmen Beasley, Johnson, Miller, Sciarrotta, Uerkwitz, Wilson, and Mayor Isen. Absent: None.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

Miss Nancy Stephenson, Senior Class President, Torrance High School, led in the salute to the flag, at the request of Mayor Isen.

4. INVOCATION:

Minister for the Month of November, Reverend Louis C. Smith, Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, gave the invocation for the meeting.

Mayor Isen took this opportunity to remind the Council of the Ministerial Breakfast to be held on November 12th at the First Baptist Church.

STANDARD MOTIONS:

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved that the minutes of the regular meeting of October 21, 1969 be approved as recorded. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and there were no objections.

The minutes of October 7, 1969 were corrected as follows: Page 3, Paragraph 3 should read: "Mayor Isen thereupon nominated Mr. George Allison to the Torrance Beautiful Commission;" (instead of Citizens' Advisory Commission.) There were no objections, and the October 7th minutes stood approved, as above corrected.

6. APPROVAL OF DEMANDS:

Councilman Beasley moved that all properly audited demands be paid. His motion, seconded by Councilman Johnson, carried as follows:

7. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Uerkwitz moved that after the Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each Councilman the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The motion, seconded by Councilman Wilson, was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Specifically noted by Mayor Isen, with particular pleasure, was the selection of the City of Torrance for a small convention by the White Oliver Farm Equipment dealers.

11. City Contribution for SECURITY POLICE FOR AIRPORT.

RECOMMENDATION OF FINANCE DIRECTOR/BUDGET OFFICER.

That the City Council authorize the appropriation of \$10,220 from the General Fund Unappropriated Surplus for contributions to the Airport for Security Police, and authorize the return of the same amount as contribution from the Airport to the City's General Fund for general government services.

9. \$356.68 to Precision Business Forms for 14,400 3-part data processing forms as requested by the Data Processing Department for use in their operations. There were "No Bids" received from I.B.M. and from Moore Business Forms.

B. REIMBURSABLE ITEMS:

11. \$1007.48 to Hersey-Sparling Meter Company for one only 4-inch water meter with bronze case complete with check valves on main and intermediate flow lines as requested by the Water Department. This meter is being used for the Torrance Unified School District service for which payment has already been received.
12. \$675.15 to American Sprinkler & Supply Company for 5,000 feet of 1-inch pipe plus 250 couplings as requested by the Traffic and Lighting Department to be used in the undergrounding utility district from Anza to Madrona. This expenditure is fully reimbursable from the 1911 Act Bond.
13. (Considered separately).

MOTION: Councilman Sciarrotta moved to approve agenda items #11, 12, 13, 14, 15, and #16 (excluding A-10 and B-13). His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and carried as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Beasley, Johnson, Miller, Sciarrotta,
Uerkwitz, Wilson, and Mayor Isen.
NOES: COUNCILMEN: None.

Attention was now directed to A-10 of agenda item #16 - Marbelite Street Lighting poles to upgrade the Walteria area Lighting District #9. A lengthy discussion ensued - there still being general dissatisfaction with what has been proposed - the primary objection being to the skinny pole. The following action resulted: Councilman Miller MOVED to hold the matter of the Street Lighting poles for one week. His motion was seconded by Councilman Beasley, and there were no objections.

As to agenda item #16, B-13, it was clarified by Director of Recreation Van Bellehem, at Councilman Uerkwitz' question, that the material is purchased for the use of students in the classes and is reimbursed by the students from the fees collected. MOTION: Councilman Uerkwitz moved to approve B-13 of agenda item #16. The motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

(Item B-13: \$1275.92 to Martin Hannum Inc. for 133 ounces of sterling silver, 38 ounces of gold and 10 ounces of bronze as requested by the Recreation Department for use in their Arts and Craft classes. The City is reimbursed for this expenditure from fees collected from class participants.)

PLANNING AND ZONING MATTERS:

17. ORDINANCE requiring conditional use permits for the operation of public utilities in all zones.

City Manager Ferraro advised that representatives from the utility companies have pointed out a need for clarification in some of the wording in the ordinance; Mr. Ferraro feels the point is well taken, and recommended that the matter be delayed one week.

Mr. Bob Boyington, District Manager, Southern California Edison Company 505 Maple, outlined proposed future development plans of his company, and confirmed their desire for undergrounding of utilities.

Discussion followed on the proposed ordinance, and it was the consensus that an appropriate committee of utility representatives and Staff be formed for review of the ordinance, with a 30-day postponement of agenda item #17; further, that the recommendations of this committee be referred to the Council Public Works Committee. Councilman Beasley so MOVED. His motion was seconded by Mayor Isen, and there were no objections.

It was the unofficial recommendation of Mayor Isen that Mr. Boyington serve as chairman of the utility committee and select its membership.

PERSONNEL MATTERS:

18. INCREASED INSURANCE BENEFITS.

RECOMMENDATION OF CITY MANAGER/SR. ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT.

Re: Unused insurance money--should a City employee terminate before January 1, 1970, that the terminating employee receive this money at the time of termination.

MOTION: Councilman Beasley moved to concur with the above recommendation. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

19. RESOLUTION RE: UNIFORM ALLOWANCE - FIRE AND POLICE SAFETY EMPLOYEES.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 69-280

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING RESOLUTION
NO. 69-183 TO ADD PROVISION REGARDING
UNIFORM ALLOWANCES FOR SAFETY EMPLOYEES.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 69-280. His motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

COMMUNITY AFFAIRS:

28. VETERAN'S RIGHTS COORDINATING COMMITTEE request for support of legislation regarding increased educational benefits for veterans.

Mr. Larry Marbut, chairman of the subject committee, 734½ Bay View Drive, Hermosa Beach, read aloud material in support of their campaign for increased veteran's educational benefits under the G.I. Bill. Mr. Marbut's request for Council support in this cause was discussed at some length -- City Attorney Remelmeyer elaborated on

complications which might result with Council participation in matters that are not related to municipal affairs.

It was the suggestion of Councilman Johnson that letters be prepared on personal stationery of the Councilmen, directed to President Nixon, in this matter, such letters to be prepared by the City Manager's office. Councilman Johnson so MOVED. His motion was seconded by Councilman Uerkwitz, and there were no objections.

STREETS AND SIDEWALKS:

20. IMPROVEMENT OF GRAMERCY PLACE FROM 180TH STREET NORTH TO END.
(B69-58) Job 68079.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF ACTING CITY ENGINEER:

1. That all bids be rejected and the project be readvertised; and
2. That an additional \$2,500 be appropriated from the General Fund Unappropriated Surplus.

Councilman Beasley MOVED to concur with the above recommendations of the Acting City Engineer. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

SEWERS AND DRAINAGE:

21. SANITARY SEWERS IN SEPULVEDA BOULEVARD AND IN MADRONA AVENUE
(B68-63) JOB NO. 68064 - NOTICE OF COMPLETION.

RECOMMENDATION OF ACTING CITY ENGINEER:

That Council accept the work on the subject improvement.

(This project is financed by \$65,000 appropriated from the Sewer Revolving Fund on September 3, 1968.)

MOTION: Councilman Miller moved to concur with the above recommendation of the Acting City Engineer. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

REAL PROPERTY:

22. IMPROVEMENT OF SEPULVEDA BOULEVARD FROM CRENSHAW BOULEVARD TO ARLINGTON AVENUE.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF ACTING CITY ENGINEER:

1. That \$100,000 in 2106 Gas Tax Funds be appropriated for the referenced project.
2. That acquisition of right-of-way for widening Crenshaw Boulevard to allow provision of right turn lanes be approved.

MOTION: Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur with the above recommendations of the Acting City Engineer. His motion was seconded by Councilman Miller, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

23. PROPOSED ASSESSMENT DISTRICT - MARICOPA STREET BETWEEN AMIE AND MADRONA AVENUES.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF ACTING CITY ENGINEER:

1. That the City Council direct the Acting City Engineer to prepare preliminary plans and a cost estimate for the acquisition of right-of-way, demolition of structures, and construction of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, and pavement to open and complete Maricopa Street between Amie and Madrona Avenues;
2. That the City Attorney be directed to prepare a Resolution of Intention indicating that the above work will be accomplished under the provisions of the Improvement Act of 1911; and
3. That an appraiser (from the City's approved list) be engaged to determine the value of the property to be acquired.

MOTION: Councilman Miller moved to concur with the above recommendations of the Acting City Engineer. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

24. DUWAYNE MEYER AND PHILIP DOLIM (DBA BENBOW AVIATION MAINTENANCE) REQUEST FOR APPROVAL:

1. Their subtenancy on the Chester and Alford leasehold;
2. To operate a Flight School; and
3. Hangar apron use permit.

Councilman Beasley inquired as to the number of flight schools presently on the Airport, the Council having previously gone on record that there not be more than three or four flight schools at one time -- Airport Manager Egan advised that there are more than that now at the Airport.

Councilman Sciarrotta then MOVED that the subject matter be referred to the Council Transportation Committee for review and revision of Council policy regarding flight schools. The motion was seconded by Councilman Uerkwitz, and there were no objections.

The proponent, Mr. Duwayne Meyer, (telephone 325-3804), advised the Council that he has never sold the business, and that it actually is in operation at the present time. Mr. Meyer agreed to take this up with the Council Committee when they meet on this matter.

25. T-HANGAR DEVELOPMENT PROJECT.

- A. Airport T-Hangar Development - (1) Project Funding; and (2) Contract Award - East "T" Hangar Area at Torrance Municipal Airport (B69-57).
- B. Airport T-Hangar Development - Water Line Construction.
- C. RESOLUTION authorizing the execution of a Line Extension Agreement with Southern California Edison Company on the Torrance Airport.
- D. RESOLUTION and lease for H.T. Halibrand in the T-Hangar Development Area.

It was the request of Councilman Uerkwitz that this item be referred to the Council Public Works Committee inasmuch as there is an extensive policy question involved.

It was agreed that the Public Works Committee would meet on Thursday, November 6th, at 4:00 P.M., and there were no objections.

TRAFFIC AND LIGHTING:

- 26. RESOLUTION establishing NO STOPPING ANYTIME restrictions on the north side of Pacific Coast Highway from Ladeene Avenue westerly to a point 513 easterly of the South High School pedestrian overpass.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 69-281

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING ARTICLE I OF RESOLUTION NO. 64-242 WHICH ESTABLISHES "NO STOPPING ANYTIME" RESTRICTIONS, BY ADDING A CERTAIN LOCATION THERETO.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 69-281. His motion was seconded by Councilman Miller, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

Mayor Isen reiterated an earlier recommendation - that on routine traffic matters there should be some short cut method, with appeal to the Council. City Attorney Remelmeyer advised that such an arrangement is being researched, and a report will be forthcoming.

PARK AND RECREATION:

- 27. RESCHEDULING OF COUNCIL-RECREATION COMMISSION BUS TOUR.
Request from Director of Recreation to reschedule tour of parks by Commissioners and Councilmen from November 8, 1969 to some date in the future, preferably December 13, 1969.

Councilman Beasley moved that the request be noted and filed; his motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and there were no objections, it being determined that the December 13th date is satisfactory with the Council.

The hour being 6:30 P.M. Councilman Sciarrotta moved to recess as City Council, and reconvene as the Redevelopment Agency. The motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson, and there were no objections. A 10-minute recess followed at 6:31 P.M.

ITEMS NOT OTHERWISE CLASSIFIED:

29. VEHICLE ACCIDENT STUDY - FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

Councilman Uerkwitz commended Administrative Intern John Mauk on an outstanding report, and MOVED that the Council concur with the recommendations contained therein, except that the decision pertaining to the position of the Training Officer be delayed until a later date. The motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson, and there were no objections.

Officer Phillip Joseph, Torrance Police Officers Association, referred to Recommendation #5 in the subject report re: Vehicle Accident Review Board and any recommended disciplinary action; Sr. Administrative Assistant Jackson confirmed that this would be a "meet and confer" item.

SECOND READING ORDINANCES:

30. ORDINANCE NO. 2035.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for its second reading:

ORDINANCE NO. 2035

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING DIVISION 9 OF THE TORRANCE MUNICIPAL CODE TO RECLASSIFY THAT CERTAIN PROPERTY WHICH IS LOCATED ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF REDONDO BEACH BOULEVARD AND ON THE EAST SIDE OF WILKIE AVENUE, AND DESCRIBED IN ZONE CHANGE CASE 69-23.
(Pioneer Theatres, Inc.)

Councilman Sciarrotta moved for the adoption of Ordinance No. 2035 at its second and final reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and carried as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Beasley, Johnson, Sciarrotta, Uerkwitz,
Wilson, and Mayor Isen.
NOES: COUNCILMEN: Miller.

31. ORDINANCE NO. 2037.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for its second reading:

ORDINANCE NO. 2037

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE REPEALING SECTION 37.2.4 AND SECTION 37.2.5 RELATING TO APPLICATIONS FOR PARADE PERMITS AND SUBSTITUTING A NEW SECTION 37.2.4 AND A NEW SECTION 37.2.5 THEREFOR.

Councilman Uerkwitz moved for the adoption of Ordinance No. 2037 at its second and final reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

31A. Mayor Isen referred to Information Item A re: Junior Citizens Day, December 16, 1969, and suggested that an effort be made to secure Congressman Glenn Anderson as the speaker on that occasion; there were no objections.

ADDENDUM ITEM:

32. REQUEST TO HOLD DEMONSTRATION OF PEACE.

The request of the Human Relations Club of South High School to hold a demonstration of peace on November 14, 1969, at El Retiro Park from 3:00 to 6:00 P.M. was noted, as was the recommendation of Director of Recreation Van Bellehem that the permit not be granted, in the interest of public safety, and his suggestion that a larger and more accessible location would prove acceptable. Park Superintendent Clemmer further explained that the installation of a new sprinkling system, involving many open trenches, has just been undertaken.

Miss Kathie Yockey was present on this matter, and advised that their alternative was Walteria Park. She was advised that this park is much too small and very heavily used.

The large area behind Civic Center was recommended by Mayor Isen as a logical place for the proposed demonstration -- a further suggestion was the Torrance Beach parking lot -- and the following action was taken:

Councilman Beasley MOVED that the Director of Recreation and the City Manager resolve this problem, and be authorized to act for the Council in this matter. The motion was seconded by Mayor Isen, and there were no objections.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

33. City Manager Ferraro reported that the State has authorized a contract for the installation of left turn signals at Pacific Coast Highway and Hawthorne Boulevard, with the work to be completed by approximately December 15, 1969.

34. Need for a delegate for the National League of Cities meeting in San Diego in December was reported by City Manager Ferraro. Councilman Miller MOVED that Councilman Beasley be the delegate; his motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and there were no objections.

35. The Council meeting schedule for the month of December was reviewed, and it was the request of Mayor Isen that a meeting be scheduled for Thursday, December 4, 1969, at 5:30 P.M., inasmuch as the Council will be in San Diego on December 2nd. There were no objections.

* * * *

It was necessary at this time (7:00 P.M.), with the realization that the Redevelopment Agency meeting earlier in the evening had not been properly adjourned, to recess as City Council and reconvene as the Redevelopment Agency. Councilman Sciarrotta so MOVED; the motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and there were no objections. The Council returned to resume Oral Communications at 7:01 P.M.

Formal action was then taken in that Mayor Isen MOVED that Council go dark on December 2, 1969, and that the regular meeting of December 2, 1969 be held instead on Thursday, December 4, 1969, at 5:30 P.M. in the Council Chambers in Torrance City Hall. The motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

36. City Attorney Remelmeyer advised that a convention of the cable broadcasters is being held in San Diego for four days, commencing November 9th, and that a member of the study group, Deputy Fire Chief Slonecker has been selected by him and the City Manager for attendance. Council approval of Deputy Fire Chief Slonecker's attending this convention, with appropriate expenses paid, was requested by Mr. Remelmeyer. Councilman Johnson so MOVED, seconded by Councilman Wilson, and unanimously approved by roll call vote.

37. Further reported by City Attorney Remelmeyer was the fact that a criminal complaint has been filed against Ken Battram by the District Attorney for grand theft, arising from certain actions which were the subject of the recent Walter Nollac case.

Mr. Remelmeyer requested authority at this time to file a civil suit against Mr. Battram to recover the amounts which Mr. Battram owes the City as a result of the alteration of certain documents. Mayor Isen so MOVED, adding to the motion that, at the discretion of the City Attorney, all other defendants be named that are considered proper parties. The motion was seconded by Councilman Beasley, following clarification and confirmation of the amount of money involved, and the fact that this could be handled by the City Attorney's staff. Roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

Further clarified by Mr. Remelmeyer was that the above action includes authority to sue for any other sums which may be deemed proper. Mayor Isen requested that this be incorporated in the above motion; there were no objections.

38. Councilman Beasley advised that his absence from recent Council meetings has been occasioned by an ear operation which proved extremely painful -- it is his hope to be in regular attendance henceforth, and he is very appreciative of the many courtesies extended him.

39. Councilman Miller advised Water System Manager Borgwat of complaints received relative to dust at the Elm Street Water Yard. Mr. Borgwat advised that he is aware of the situation, and that efforts are being made to remedy the problem.

40. The resignation of Mr. Larry Bowman from the Civil Service Commission (Information Item D) was noted by Councilman Uerkwitz, who recommended that the Council give early consideration to his replacement.

41. Councilman Wilson described difficulties presented by barricades placed at Cordary and 170th Streets. City Traffic Engineer Horkay explained that this had come about as a result of a petition from all the residents affected, and that it is an unauthorized entrance to the parking lot at this location. Dr. Wilson thought there might be a better solution; City Manager Ferraro will make a study and report back.

42. Mayor Isen referred to the communication from Building and Safety Director McKinnon stating that Dow Chemical Company has donated the styrofoam used in the concrete forming of the exterior walls of the Main Library, resulting in a \$2000 saving in the overall construction cost to the City. This contribution was gratefully acknowledged, on behalf of the Council, by Mayor Isen, with formal acknowledgment to be made to Dow Chemical, truly a good citizen in Torrance, at the appropriate time.

43. Announced by City Librarian West was the donation of \$1800 from the Torrance Lions Club toward furnishing the Blind Room at the Main Library, with a significant donation likewise having been made by Harpers of California.

44. Further evidence that Torrance is the "Home of Champions" was noted by Mayor Isen in that Mr. Bob Atrendeen of Torrance for the second time in four years won the National Aerobatic Championship. Mayor Isen thereupon MOVED that a permaplaque resolution be prepared for this national champion, for presentation at the proper time. The motion was seconded by Councilman Uerkwitz, and there were no objections.

45. Mr. Bob Flora, 2529 Date Circle, expressed appreciation to the Police Department and City employees who made a successful Halloween possible in the Hickory Park area.

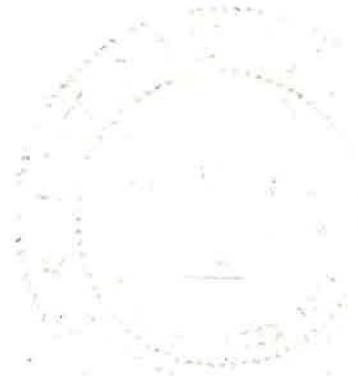
