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MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING
OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCILOPENING CEREMONIES:1. CALL TO ORDER:

The Torrance City Council convened in a regular meeting on Tuesday, January 19, 1971, at 5:30 P.M. in the Council Chambers at Torrance City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Responding to roll call by City Clerk Coil were: Councilmen Brewster, Johnson, Sciarrotta, Surber, Uerkwitz, Wilson, and Mayor Miller. Absent: None.

Also present: City Manager Ferraro, Assistant City Manager Scharfman, City Attorney Remelmeyer, City Clerk Coil, and City Treasurer Rupert.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

At the request of Mayor Miller, Jackie Brooks led in the salute to the flag.

4. INVOCATION:

Reverend Milton Sippel, First Christian Church, gave the invocation.

STANDARD MOTIONS:5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

The minutes of January 5th were corrected by Councilman Brewster as follows: Page 15, Item 39, 5th line which states "...will take action relative to a report prepared by SCAG..." and is incorrect and should read: "...will take action relative to a report prepared by a subcommittee on Urban Problems and entitled 'Changing Roles for Cities'." Further in the same paragraph, it is stated "...but he also believed the ramifications thereof were serious and he recommended that attempts be made to forestall any action..." Actually the recommendation was "that attempts be made to forestall any immediate action thereby providing time for study in the completion of a parallel effort by SCAG."

Councilman Sciarrotta moved for approval of the minutes of the regular meeting of January 5, 1971, as above corrected. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

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6. APPROVAL OF DEMANDS:

Councilman Johnson moved that all properly audited demands be paid. His motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, carried as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Brewster, Johnson, Sciarrotta,
Surber, Uerkwitz, Wilson and
Mayor Miller.

NOES: COUNCILMEN: None.

7. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Uerkwitz moved that after the Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each Councilman the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The Motion, seconded by Councilman Wilson, was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

8. COUNCIL COMMITTEES:

Police, Fire and Public Safety: Councilman Uerkwitz reported that the meeting scheduled this date was cancelled, and this committee will next meet in February.

Environmental Committee: Their next meeting will be on January 25th at 3:30 P.M., according to Councilman Uerkwitz.

Transportation Committee: Councilman Surber advised that they had met this date and that a report will be available next week.

Goals Steering Committee: A meeting of this committee is scheduled for Tuesday, January 26th, at 5:00 P.M., according to Councilman Wilson.

This being Junior Citizens' Day Mayor Miller, on behalf of the Council, extended a special welcome to the students, teachers and parents present on this occasion.

HEARINGS - PLANNING AND ZONING:

9. VARIANCE 70-16, KENNETH T. STOREY.
Request for a variance of the provisions of the R-3 zone to permit a barber shop in an existing building at 18082 Prairie Avenue. PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDS DENIAL.

An Affidavit of Publication was presented by City Clerk Coil, and it was ordered filed, there being no objection.

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Mayor Miller announced that this is the time and place for the public hearing on Variance 70-16, and inquired if anyone wished to be heard.

City Clerk Coil advised that a petition with numerous names requesting that the variance be granted had been received.

Speaking at this time was Pastor Johnson, 18090 Prairie Avenue, who stated that he is the landlord of the subject building, and then described the circumstances surrounding this request -- the fact that Mr. Storey's barber shop has been caught up in the progress of the community in that extensive redevelopment is to take place at the corner of 182nd and Prairie. This has resulted in relocation of the barber shop in a former beauty shop.

It was further indicated by Pastor Johnson that there will be no conflict in parking since his barber shop is closed on Sundays, the needed two parking spaces have been granted him in the adjoining church parking lot -- however, the Staff condition recommending elimination of the lot line would not be advantageous, in Pastor Johnson's opinion, since their present church parking lot covers those two lots which makes it one parcel insofar as usage is concerned, and could present problems in the future in the event of sale of the property.

Councilman Wilson noted the Staff condition that this variance be terminated two years from the date of approval, and that upon termination the building in which the barber shop is located be removed -- Pastor Johnson confirmed his understanding of this, but requested, in view of their period of transition, that he be permitted to appear at the end of two years, if necessary to request a time extension.

It was stated by Councilman Johnson that he has watched the growth of Reverend Johnson's church with much satisfaction -- it seems to Mr. Johnson that hardship is shown in this case in that the church does obtain revenue from the barber shop's utilization of the building, and with reconsideration in two years possible there seems to be necessary control -- no parking problems are presently evident, and Councilman Johnson will support this request.

Pastor Johnson, at Councilman Uerkwitz' question, confirmed that the parking arrangements had been resolved, noting that they have lived in coexistence for over two years and that they are still friends.

Noted by Councilman Sciarrotta was that Mr. Storey has been in this vicinity for a number of years, and made his livelihood in this area, with many established customers. Mr. Sciarrotta is of the opinion that Mr. Storey has a hardship case.

Mr. William Largent, 18832 Felbar Avenue, recommended approval of the subject request -- there will be no increase in

traffic, there is commercial development at this location, and it is not likely that it will degrade the neighborhood.

There being no one else who wished to be heard, Councilman Wilson moved that the hearing be closed. His motion was seconded by Councilman Surber, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

MOTION: Councilman Sciarrotta moved that Variance 70-16 be granted, subject to Staff conditions, with deletion of condition #1. The motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

PLANNING AND ZONING MATTERS:

10. Communication regarding banning use of incinerators in commercial zones.

It was the consensus of the Council that there was a need for additional background material in this matter -- the possible preemption by the State was noted by City Attorney Remelmeyer -- a need for clarification as to why medical buildings are excluded was also noted.

It was pointed out by Councilman Surber that there are difficulties in disposing of some of these materials, and there might be some merit to this type of incinerator use.

MOTION: Councilman Uerkwitz moved to refer this matter to Staff for a legal and feasibility study and prepare it for action. The motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

11. ORDINANCE re: Zone Change 70-26.

At the request of Mayor Miller, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 2188

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING DIVISION 9 OF THE TORRANCE MUNICIPAL CODE TO RECLASSIFY A PORTION OF THAT CERTAIN PROPERTY WHICH IS LOCATED SOUTH OF 235TH STREET AND NORTH OF LOMITA BOULEVARD BETWEEN SAM LEVY SCHOOL AND CRENSHAW BOULEVARD, AND DESCRIBED IN ZONE CHANGE 70-26.

(Torrance Planning Commission)

Councilman Surber moved for the approval of Ordinance No. 2188 at its first reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

STREETS AND SIDEWALKS:12. AGREEMENT WITH STATE DIVISION OF HIGHWAYS FOR RELOCATION WORK IN HAWTHORNE BOULEVARD BETWEEN PACIFIC COAST HIGHWAY AND SEPULVEDA BOULEVARD.

RESOLUTION authorizing the State Division of Highways to adjust City-owned manholes to grade. RECOMMENATION OF CITY ENGINEER: That resolution be adopted and \$120 from Street Maintenance budget be authorized for the work.

At the request of Mayor Miller, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 71-14

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, APPROVING UTILITIES AGREEMENT NO. 7Ut-4247 WITH THE STATE DIVISION OF HIGHWAYS AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE THE SAME.

Councilman Uerkwitz moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 71-14. His motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

MOTION: Councilman Wilson moved to approve the appropriation of \$120 from the Street Maintenance Budget for this work. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

ITEMS NOT OTHERWISE CLASSIFIED:13. LETTER FROM TORRANCE IRISH CLUB REGARDING THE ST. PATRICK'S DAY PARADE.

Request to hold a parade on March 20, 1971, and that the fees for permits and moving of the grandstand be absorbed by the City.

MOTION: Councilman Uerkwitz moved to concur with the subject request. His motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

14. RESOLUTION re: agreement with Barbara A. Ziegler for performance of services relating to Code.

At the request of Mayor Miller, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 71-15

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE AND ATTEST THAT CERTAIN AGREEMENT DATED JANUARY 1, 1971, WITH BARBARA A. ZIEGLER FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF PROFESSIONAL SERVICES RELATING TO THE MAINTENANCE OF THE TORRANCE MUNICIPAL CODE.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 71-15. His motion, seconded by Councilman Surber, was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

15. ORDINANCE adding the class of Real Estate Clerk to the Occupational List of Class Titles with class specification from Civil Service Commission.

At the request of Mayor Miller, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 2189

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING SECTION 17.41.2 OF PART IV, CHAPTER 7, DIVISION 1 OF THE TORRANCE MUNICIPAL CODE BY ADDING THE CLASS OF REAL ESTATE CLERK TO THE OCCUPATIONAL LIST OF CLASS TITLES FOR CERTAIN OTHER EMPLOYEES.

In view of the fact that the contractual arrangement has been quite satisfactory, Councilman Uerkwitz questioned why not continue on the same basis rather than adding an employee with attendant benefits and additional monies involved. City Attorney Remelmeyer responded that it has ever been the concept under Civil Service that when there is a full-time permanent job, such employee should be made a Civil Servant, rather than continue the contract basis.

It was noted by Councilman Johnson that this could be pursued to the extreme by saying that all City employees on contract would be a cheaper way to go -- it has been established that once a position becomes permanent those people go on Civil Service, as they should; the contract for interim or temporary employment is certainly the better way to go. In the subject situation,

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in the opinion of Councilman Johnson, now is the time to go ahead and fill the position under Civil Service.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved for the approval of Ordinance No. 2189 at its first reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and carried, with roll call vote as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Brewster, Johnson, Sciarrotta, Surber,
Wilson, and Mayor Miller.
NOES: COUNCILMEN: Uerkwitz.

16. RESOLUTION re: contract for Real Estate Technical Services between City and Glenda Blyth.

At the request of Mayor Miller, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 71-16

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE AND ATTEST THAT CERTAIN CONTRACT FOR REAL ESTATE TECHNICAL SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY AND GLENDA BLYTH.

Councilman Johnson moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 71-16. His motion, seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Councilman Uerkwitz confirmed that this is a continuation of the present contract prior to his "yes" vote.

17. RESOLUTION re: record destruction.

At the request of Mayor Miller, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE CITY CLERK TO DESTROY CERTAIN CITY RECORDS AND DOCUMENTS PURSUANT TO THE GOVERNMENT CODE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA.

Councilman Surber moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 71-17. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

18. Destruction of Records: Recommendation with regard to new procedure for the destruction of obsolete records.

MOTION: Councilman Uerkwitz moved that the Council establish Procedure No. 3 - That the City Clerk be permitted to destroy any records not required to be maintained by law upon obtaining approval in writing from the City Manager or his designated representative. The motion was seconded by Mayor Miller.

A SUBSTITUTE MOTION was made by Councilman Johnson: That the present system be retained. His motion was seconded by Councilman Surber, but failed to carry, with roll call vote as follows:

Councilman Johnson moved for the adoption of Ordinance No. 2187 at its second and final reading. His motion, seconded by Councilman Uerkwitz, carried, with roll call vote as follows:

NONCONTROVERSIAL ITEMS:21. EXPENDITURES OVER \$300:RECOMMENDATION OF FINANCE DIRECTOR:

That Council approve the following purchases:

A. BUDGETED:

1. \$346.50 to Paramount Truck Bodies for furnishing and installing one only pickup truck mounted electric lift gate as requested by the Recreation Department for Vehicle #8004 (Dodge pickup).
2. \$770.70 to Bellview Furniture Manufacturing Company for two wooden pamphlet display cases as requested by the City Librarian.
3. \$4686.51 to Odetics Video Systems, Inc. for a Sony video closed circuit television system to be used by the Police Department mainly in the jail and during booking and interview periods. This system will also be used for training and recording "key" events.
4. The following are the low bidders for Recreational supply items for the City's Art and Craft classes as requested for 1971 by the Recreation Department. All supplies will be delivered on an "as requested" basis during the course of these classes. Because there are over 150 different items involved and inasmuch as it would be impractical to list all bids received for each item it is recommended that the following awards be made:

 - \$ 734.37 to Ernst Dorn Co. for Silk Screen Supplies.
 - \$3,118.06 to Leisure Craft for General Art and Craft Supplies.

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B. REIMBURSABLE ITEM:

5. \$436.80 to Hersey Sparling Meter Company for one only 2" Hersey water meter complete with check valves and intermediate flow lines with bronze case as requested by the Water Department. Payment for this expenditure has already been received from Don Wilson for this service.

6. \$945.00 to H.W. Wilson Company for 42 periodicals.
 7. \$331.82 to Books for Libraries, Inc. for 30 adult books.

25. CLAIM OF FRANCIS ELANE BURNS for personal damages.

RECOMMENDATION OF CITY CLERK:

That said claim be denied and referred to the City Attorney.

MOTION: Councilman Sciarrotta moved that agenda items #21, 22, and 25 be approved as recommended. His motion was seconded by Councilman Brewster, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

** At this point Councilman Johnson indicated re: item #22 above that he questioned the \$500 appropriation -- it is of concern to him that the Engineer's Estimate is \$3000 and that the bids are coming in approximately \$1000 over -- Mr. Johnson can see no reason to tell the contractors that there is another \$500 in the pot. It was his recommendation that this again be put out to bid, and that the vote be on this and not to include an additional \$500. City Engineer Weaver indicated that this would be satisfactory.

MOTION: Councilman Uerkwitz moved for reconsideration of Item #22; his motion was seconded by Councilman Brewster, and there were no objections.

MOTION: Councilman Johnson moved to concur with the recommendation of the City Engineer on agenda item #22, with item #3 - "That \$500 be appropriated from the Gas Tax Funds." - be deleted. His motion was seconded by Councilman Surber, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

23. CLAIM of Glen W. Earrell for personal damages.

RECOMMENDATION OF CITY CLERK:

That said claim be denied and referred to the City Attorney.

Councilman Surber referred to a communication from the Walters Insurance Agency stating "...The officers did not give Mr. Farrell any names, just told him to report the incident to his agent and have us write you a letter with the estimates of damages to his truck." and inquired if there was a policy regarding the writing of accident reports. Police Chief Nash responded that accident reports are required, and one was written on this matter; further, that police officers furnish names and badge numbers.

MOTION: Councilman Surber moved to concur with the recommendation of the City Clerk on agenda item #23. His motion was seconded by Councilman Uerkwitz; there were no objections, and it was so ordered.

24. CLAIM of G.L. Barlup for property damages.

RECOMMENDATION OF CITY CLERK:

That said claim be denied and referred to the City Attorney.

Councilman Brewster questioned the indication in Mr. Barlup's January 8th communication that "nothing could be done unless the owners of the property reported the problem", and what is done in cases of extreme emergency where the property owner might be many miles away. City Manager Ferraro stated that such a statement would be in error; that is not the policy -- any emergency involving property is responded to regardless of who makes the call.

There was clarification as well of the role of the insurance company in this and other cases by City Attorney Remelmeyer, at Councilman Surber's question.

MOTION: Councilman Brewster moved to concur with the recommendation of the City Clerk on agenda item #24. His motion was seconded by Councilman Surber, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

26. Councilman Uerkwitz requested that the City Manager assign as one of the first duties of the new Personnel Manager the accident rate in the City of Torrance, there being an accident report on virtually every agenda.

27. It was reported by City Attorney Remelmeyer that problems have been encountered with the billboard ordinance -- the billboard industry is not satisfied with what has been prepared by him nor is the Planning Commission -- it was further learned today that the Torrance Beautiful Commission wishes to study this ordinance. Mr. Remelmeyer then requested an additional three weeks to resolve the above situation. There were no objections.

28. Next reported by City Attorney Remelmeyer was the fact that the Los Angeles Times recently carried an editorial which stated in effect that the moratorium imposed by this Council on factory-built housing was a permanent moratorium, rather than one for study. It would be worthwhile, in Mr. Remelmeyer's opinion, to have him and the City Manager write a letter to the editor of the Times pointing out the purpose of the moratorium which is only to permit study and not permanent in nature. There were no objections.

The attention of the Council was now directed to Junior Citizens Day, with takeover by the Junior Council, following adjournment of the regular Council at 6:25 P.M.

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MINUTES OF A MEETING OF THE JUNIOR COUNCIL
- JUNIOR CITIZENS DAY, 1971.

OPENING CEREMONIES:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

The Torrance Junior Council convened at 6:26 P.M. on Wednesday, January 19, 1971, in the Council Chambers at Torrance City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Responding to roll call by City Clerk Armstrong were: Councilmen Moore, Haun, Watson, Heite, Hara, Koehler, and Mayor Salisbury.

Also present: City Manager Lynn, Assistant City Manager Irelan, City Clerk Armstrong, and City Treasurer Scott.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

Mayor Salisbury led in the salute to the flag.

Introduction of parents and Exchange Students was made at this time.

* * * *

ORDER OF BUSINESS:

RECREATION MATTERS:

1. "The More Extensive Use of School Facilities by the City of Torrance for Recreation Purposes."

The following action was taken by the Council, following presentations by students:

Mayor Salisbury ordered the formation of a committee to discuss this matter with the School Board (on school time): Scott, Heite, Hara, Irelan, and City Manager Lynn.

Councilman Moore moved that the above committee work with the Torrance Youth Council; the motion was seconded by Councilman Koehler, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

TRAFFIC AND TRANSPORTATION:

2. "The Effects of Traffic and Public Transportation on the City of Torrance".

Lengthy presentations were made on the pros and cons of a freeway system and the problems of the Torrance Transit System,

as well as the acute need for a bike path in Torrance. The following action resulted: Councilman Heite moved that the Council make two distinct committees -- one to check into a bike path and one to include the freeway, RTD, and the bus situation. The motion was seconded by Councilman Haun, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

ENVIRONMENT:

3. "What can the role of City Government be in regard to our changing Environment?"

Following discussion and recommendations from the students, Councilman Moore moved that this matter be referred to the Youth Council to work out appropriate projects. The motion was seconded by Mayor Salisbury, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

A further MOTION by Councilman Heite that the City of Torrance adopt a program that includes the checking and spot-checking of emissions by the City Police Department was seconded by Councilman Watson, but failed to carry with roll call vote as follows:

AYES: Heite, Watson, and Mayor Salisbury.
NOES: Haun, Hara, Moore, and Koehler.

This was followed by more discussion and a MOTION by Councilman Koehler: That the State Legislature be made aware of the program to change our transportation system from gas to electrical with a reapportionment of affected workers. The motion died for lack of a second.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

Trash cans on every corner in the City of Torrance was recommended by a student speaker, with a MOTION offered by Councilman Heite that this be worked out through the Torrance Youth Commission. The motion was seconded by Councilman Watson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

The Senior Council returned to express its gratitude and enjoyment of Junior Citizens Day 1971, and to give each of the Junior Officials a plaque in honor of the occasion.
