ORDINANCE No. 109

An Ordinance Establishing Curfew Regulations and Certain Regulations Regarding Minors.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any minor of sixteen (16) years or under, of age, to be in any public street or other public place in the City of Torrance after the hour of nine (9) o'clock P. M. unless accompanied by guardian appointed by proper authority.

SECTION 2. The fire siren of the central fire station shall be sounded for a period of not to exceed five (5) seconds at the hour of nine (9) o'clock P. M. each evening, as a warning to all minors mentioned in the preceding section.

SECTION 3. It shall be unlawful for any proprietor or manager or owner or person in charge of any public dance hall to allow any person of sixteen (16) years or under to dance at any such dance hall after the hour of nine (9) o'clock P. M. unless accompanied by the parent or legal guardian.

SECTION 4. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance, and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.

RADIO

EDITOR'S NOTE.—In response to several requests from radio fans, Mr. Eugene DeBra is resuming his articles in The Herald. Mr. DeBra is a graduate of the Armour School of Technology, where he took a course in hydroelectricity, specializing in radio and wireless telegraphy.

Mr. DeBra was also in the Signal Corps of the United States army during the war and later took a technical course in radio. Altogether his experience in radio and wireless telegraphy has covered a period of 14 years and he will have much of interest to tell local radio owners in this and subsequent articles.

In a former series of short articles the writer attempted to give a general idea of radio and "how it works" from the broadcasting end. In this series we'll talk about the receiving end (perhaps more interesting because most of us have receivers of our own) and offer what suggestions we can for improving reception in Torrance.

The aerial and ground connection are important and, as a rule, do not receive enough attention. Too long an aerial collects too much "static," and if parallel to power lines will pick up considerable noise from them by induction. Run your aerial at right angles to power lines, as far from them and as high as possible, and make sure that your lead-in wire makes a good connection with the aerial wire. This connection should always be well taped even if soldered.

The "non-directional loop" aerial seems to give the best results in many localities. A description of how to build it will be given in the next article.

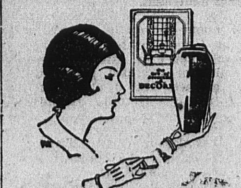

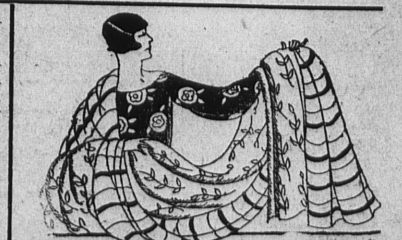
