

More Doctors Are Needed by Navy Department

The Navy is facing an immediate need for 4,000 more doctors to meet current and projected requirements, Vice Adm. Ross T. McIntire, Surgeon General of the Navy and Chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, announced in Washington today.

As the shortage of medical officers was reported, Admiral McIntire stated that the Navy's recent nurse procurement campaign produced applications from nurses in excess of the 2,500 requested. Applicants who are not appointed will be asked to apply to the Red Cross or Army for the Army Nurse Corps, since the Army needs thousands of nurses at once.

Los Angeles doctors interested in applying for the Navy Medical Corps should contact the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 411 West 5th st.

In appealing for doctors to enroll in the Navy Medical Corps, Admiral McIntire cited the "tremendous burden" being carried by Navy physicians at present and pointed out the increased need arises from the fact that, "As our combat forces throughout the world penetrate more deeply into the strongholds of the enemy, the battle will become more intense and the casualties greater. . . . Additional medical officers must be procured if adequate medical care is to be provided."

Women Needed To Aid In Issuing Canning Sugar

Five women volunteers are needed by the Torrance War Price and Rationing Board of office to assist in the forthcoming canning sugar rationing, according to Frank W. Daniels, chief clerk.

Lomita already has volunteered five women, and Torrance is asked to do the same to insure speedy issuance of the coupons.

Meanwhile, Torrance City Council solved the problem of paying for an extra clerk to keep the wheels of the office running smoothly by voting \$125 a month for the salary.

Chief J. E. McMaster, who on May 4 rounded out 20 years with the Torrance Fire Department, was the guest of honor at a party given by some 20 members of his department and volunteers on Monday night. He was presented with a fishing tackle box by the firemen and call men, and cut a huge cake in honor of the day.

Chief McMaster came to Torrance in 1919, and went on the fire department as a call man on May 4, 1925. Six years later, he became a regular operator-engineer, and five years ago he was made chief of the department.

Motorists Give Police Their Aid In Brake Drive

Motorists are cooperating with Torrance police departments in the nationwide brake emphasis program, designed to reduce traffic accidents and conserve war-vital automobiles. "Most motorists," Chief of Police John Stroh said, "recognize the dangers of faulty brakes and hence are submitting to the 60-second brake checks when requested to do so by police and highway patrol officers."

"The test is made with a small wooden U-shaped block, one inch thick, which is placed on the floorboard, astride the brake pedal. The inspecting officer then depresses the brake. If the pedal touches the wooden block, the motorist is asked to have adjustments or repairs made."

Police are making the check only on automobiles involved in accidents, cars stopped for moving traffic violations, or those having obviously defective brakes. They are making no arrests, except for traffic violations.

To avoid even the small inconvenience of the brake check, the chief is urging motorists to have their brakes inspected voluntarily. According to a nationwide survey made before the program opened, adequate supplies for brake repairs are available.

The six-week emphasis program, which will last until June 1, is being sponsored by the International Association of Police Chiefs, and is supported throughout the nation by more than 100 organizations interested in traffic safety and wartime conservation.
