A huge thanksgiving for peace ceremony, first of its kind scheduled for the Southland since cessation of hostilities in the Pacific last August 14, will be held at Long Beach Bixby Park Saturday, Sept. 8, under auspices of The All States Society.

Preparations are under way to accommodate 25,000 to 40,000 persons. A patriotic program dedicated to permanent peace will highlight the day's event with leaders of Protestant, Catholic and Jewish faiths taking part in the ceremonies.

Among the speakers will be Commander Lewis Glulick, U. S. N., who served in the thick of the European war; Los Angeles County Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz, Col. Ted Davis, Apache Indian Chief, and Jerry Steelsmith, Master of Ceremonies.

The All States Society comprises former residents of every state in the union. Its roster includes hundreds now residing in Southern California communities who promise to converge on Long Beach in large numbers for Saturday's colorful gathering.

The American Legion and other patriotic groups will take part in the program which will open with a concert by the Long Beach Municipal Band at 1:30 P. M.

Canning Sugar Again Available To Housewives

Issuance of sugar for home canning—halted Aug. 13 so that an estimate of the supply remaining could be made—will be resumed at once at all district ration boards, Frank S. Balthis Jr., OPA district director, announced today. Applicants will be limited to a maximum of five pounds per person, he said. The overall supply of sugar, Balthis said, is at an extremely low point and little improvement can be expected soon. "Undoubtedly," he said, "rationing of sugar will have to continue for many months—otherwise, inequitable distribution would certainly result."

Chief Boatswain's Mate Joe Miller, USN, of 26237 Eshelman ave., Lomita, will have been on the Pacific war from start to finish.

As a member of the USS Missouri crew, he will see Gen. MacArthur, other dignitaries and Japanese representatives come aboard for the surrender signing Sunday.

During the Pearl Harbor attack, Miller was aboard the USS Nevada, which was badly damaged. A veteran of 11 years navy service, he has been on the Missouri since its commissioning and has participated in many of the major Pacific naval battles.

His present tour of sea duty began last fall, and he has yet to meet his twin sons, John Allen and James Alvin, born Jan. 22 at San Pedro hospital. His wife, the former Eileen Waite, and another son, Barry, 2, live at the Eshelman ave. address.

A tribute to the gallant people of the Philippines and the United Nations, who sacrificed so much for victory, the affair is sponsored by the Chest Council, the United National War Relief Council and the Women's Committee of the Chest.

Released War Prisoners To Get More Red Points

American civilians arriving in this country from enemy prison camps may receive, with the approval of the Deputy Administrator for rationing, 100 extra red points for meats, fats, fish and cheese, the Office of Price Administration said today. Repatriates also will receive the last sugar stamp.

Issuance of the rations, in War Ration Book Four, will be handled by designated War Price and Ration Boards at the ports where the ships land the former internees.

OPA explained that War Ration Book Four is issued to other new applicants with all meat-fats stamps except the last valid series tailored from the book.

Most repatriates liberated from Japanese internment camps, however, are suffering from serious dietary deficiencies and malnutrition, and would be eligible for supplemental meat-fats points under special provisions made for persons in poor health.
