MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING
OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

OPENING CEREMONIES AND PRESENTATIONS:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

A regular meeting of the Torrance City Council was held on Tuesday, June 16, 1964, at 5:30 p.m., in the Council Chambers of City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Those responding to roll call by City Clerk Coil were:
COUNCILMEN: Beasley, Lyman, Miller, Olson, Sciarrotta, Vico, and Mayor Isen. City Manager Ferraro and City Attorney Remelmeyer were also present.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

At the request of Mayor Isen, Mrs. Barnes of the League of Women Voters led the salute to our Flag.

4. INVOCATION:

Former Councilman Nickolas O. Drale opened the meeting with an invocation.

5. PRESENTATIONS:

On behalf of the Council and the City of Torrance, Mayor Isen and Councilman Sciarrotta presented to former Councilmen Benstead and Drale, respectively, perma plaque resolutions and an Omega watch suitably engraved for their many years of service. Each responded graciously and a short recess was declared so that the audience might meet and talk with them.

STANDARD MOTIONS:

6. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Councilman Olson noted an error on page 3 of the June 3rd minutes where the word "Councilman" should be substituted for "Commissioner" and on page 11, the word "Absent" for "Noes". With these two corrections, Councilman Beasley moved to approve the minutes of the adjourned meeting of June 3 and the regular meeting of June 9, 1964, as written. Councilman Olson seconded and there was no objection.

7. APPROVAL OF DEMANDS:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved all demands regularly audited be paid. His motion was seconded by Councilman Beasley and carried as follows:

8. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Beasley moved that after the Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each councilman the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The motion was seconded by Councilman Vico and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

9. SECOND READING ORDINANCE NO. 1495.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for second reading, and read title to:

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for second reading and read title to:

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1496 at its second and final reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Beasley and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

11. SECOND READING ORDINANCE NO. 1497.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil presented for second reading, and read title to:

ORDINANCE NO. 1497

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY CLERK TO RECEIVE ADDITIONAL COMPENSATION FOR EXTRA DUTIES AND WORKING HOURS.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1497 at its second and final reading. His motion was seconded by Councilman Beasley and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

HEARINGS:

12. Lt. Donald S. Hamilton - City Attorney submitting opinion No. 64-23 re reviewing power of Council on ruling of Civil Service Commission, with transcript for Council use only.

Mayor Isen commented this would be a good time to set a definite date for this matter to be heard before the Council acting as a quasi judicial appeal body and Attorney Anderson agreed. The date set was July 7, 1964 at 4:30 p.m. and Councilman Beasley so moved. His motion, seconded by Councilman Vico, carried, there being no objection.

Attorney Anderson acknowledged and waived further notice for and on behalf of himself and his client, Donald S. Hamilton who was present. The Regular Council Meeting to be held June 30, 1964 therefore should be adjourned to July 7, 1964 at 4:30 p.m. The first item of business at 5:30 the usual meeting time, will be the hearing on Donald S. Hamilton.

13. FIRST PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF TORRANCE.

Affidavit of Publication was presented by City Clerk Coil and there being no objection, ordered filed.

City Manager Ferraro announced the second public hearing is slated for June 23 at 8:00 p.m. Budget work sessions of the Council are currently being held and this is the time to speak, if anyone wishes to do so.

Mr. Sam Hunegs who evidently had spoken before one of the work sessions, summarized the request made: a 5½% general increase for all employees; differential for night work; pay for accumulated sick leave at the rate of half day's pay for each day of sick leave at the time of retirement or honorable separation; and longevity pay in increments of 5½% at five, twelve and nineteen years of service. He stated a 2% increase would be necessary in order to keep purchasing power at the same level as last year - not to do so, would be tantamount to a 2% cut. He stated also regardless of what recommendations are made along the line of equalization, there will continue to be inequities between classes of employment. He recommended use of the Los Angeles Joint Salary Survey rather than comparison with certain other cities.

Mr. Hunegs represents Council 20 of American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees and he introduced Mr. Robert White who represents the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor and resides at 3242 Torrance Boulevard. Mr. White stated his organization is interested in seeing that the City's employees maintain the standards of living, wages and working conditions that have made this City what it is.

Mr. Leonard Muskin, 2114 Cold Water Canyon Drive, Los Angeles, California, spoke as a builder and property owner in Torrance. His problem involves reimbursement for a street improvement in the Sovereign Development complex which covers 18½ acres within the boundaries of Carson, Maple, Monterey and Madrona. His reason for presenting the matter was so that the Council could consider the budget in light of the \$25,000 which the City presumably owes this builder and the fact that all or a part of it will be paid within this, or a coming year. City Manager Ferraro said it is a valid request, but Mayor Isen suggested Mr. Muskin work with the City Manager, the City Attorney and present a complete written history and recommendation as to the legality of the claim, at the second hearing on the budget, June 23rd. It will be in the form of an addendum, Mr. Remelmeyer said.

Mr. Mel Hone of the Torrance Police Officers Association presented a brief resume of what had been presented to the Council at a work session. He stated the request for increase for the Police Department is based on the local police labor market competition, considering the standing of Torrance as fourth largest city within the County, and outlined the various factors which affect that labor market. At this time, he said, the Torrance patrolman is \$9.00 behind Los Angeles Police Department and with the increase which Los Angeles is giving as of the first of the fiscal year, the difference will be \$47. If the increase recommended by the City Manager is given, there will still remain \$30 difference. Torrance is not receiving enough qualified applications.

He recommended an increase in excess of what the City Manager has proposed in order to put the department in a competitive position as to the other cities: 8½% as to the Police Chief. As modified, he stated there is now asked the 1959 Survivors' Act, commonly known as the 25 bill, under which the employee would contribute \$2 per month and the City \$5 per month for the first year and thereafter one-half of that amount to provide a maximum payment of \$250 in event of death before retirement.

In conclusion, he stated the City of Torrance has, needs and deserves an outstanding police department.

There appearing no one else to speak, Councilman Beasley moved to close the hearing. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta. The final hearing will be June 23rd, an 8:00 meeting.

PLANNING AND ZONING MATTERS:

14. Proposed resolution on Case No. 64-29, Bringas.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 64-118

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE GRANTING A VARIANCE FROM THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 6, APPENDIX I OF "THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954" AS APPLIED FOR IN PLANNING COMMISSION CASE NO. 64-29 - R. E. Bringas.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to adopt Resolution No. 64-118. His motion was seconded by Councilman Vico and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

REAL PROPERTY:

15. PROPOSED TRADE OF PROPERTY WITH THE DOMINGUEZ ESTATE COMPANY IN THE VICINITY OF TORRANCE CITY YARD.

The recommendation is that the City Council authorize the proposed exchange of property and direct the City Attorney to prepare the necessary documents to accomplish same. Councilman Miller moved to concur and his motion, seconded by Councilman Lyman, carried as follows:

BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES, AND SIGNS:

16. OVERSIZE SIGN - RED BALLOON RESTAURANT:

Recommendation of Superintendent of Building Inspection, with concurrence of City Manager, that request for an oversize sign for the Red Balloon at 17544 Hawthorne Boulevard, be denied.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur in the recommendation to deny and his motion, seconded by Councilman Vico, carried, there being no objection.

TRAFFIC AND PARKING:

17. Communication from Traffic and Lighting Engineer regarding petition from residents of the 300 block on Paseo de la Playa.

Councilman Miller thought such special permits for parking as are requested would be unconstitutional and at his suggestion, Mayor Isen said if there was no objection, the matter would be continued two weeks for an opinion by the City Attorney. There was no objection.

18. LICENSE BETWEEN CITY AND FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH. Proposed resolution authorizing execution of agreement, with reference to parking.

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION NO. 64-119

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY CLERK TO EXECUTE AND ATTEST THAT CERTAIN AGREEMENT, DATED JUNE 16, 1964, BETWEEN THE CITY AND THE FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH OF TORRANCE WITH REFERENCE TO VEHICULAR PARKING.

Councilman Vico moved to adopt Resolution No. 64-119 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Olson, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

19. Communication from City Attorney regarding unauthorized parking at Hawthorne and Sepulveda Boulevards.

Mayor Isen stated this letter is informational and as such would be filed if there were no objections; there was none.

PERSONNEL MATTERS:

20. Communication from City Manager regarding Holidays - Election Day.

Mayor Isen thought the City Hall should be closed on this type of holiday, but the employees should be working therein. City Manager Ferraro said he would like to see the resolution amended to so provide and Mayor Isen moved a matter of policy to follow these remarks. Councilman Lyman seconded the motion which carried, there being no objection.

Charles Oates of the Police Officers Association thought this would an unfortunate policy and not what was anticipated by the request made.

Mayor Isen pointed out there are eleven paid holidays and there is a workload to accomplish, even though the public does not come into City Hall on a particular day. No action was taken to amend City Manager Ferraro's ruling regarding Election Day, June 2d. Officer Oates asked again for a clarification of policy and Mr. Ferraro told him, by the motion made, seconded and carried, the clarification has been made.

John Kirkpatrick of Engineering Department, felt that Resolution No. 62-130 should be changed, because he did not think the public should be excluded on any day when employees are working in City Hall.

City Manager Ferraro thought the motion would go far toward correcting the situation. City Clerk Coil called attention to the application of this motion to his office; on election day in particular his office is swamped with telephone calls and many people come in.

21. Communication from City Manager regarding promulgation of Chief of Police Examination.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to certify the list of persons who successfully passed both the written and oral examinations for Chief of Police. His motion was seconded by Councilman Lyman and carried by unanimous roll call vote.

FISCAL MATTERS:

22. BID - CHAIN LINK FENCING AND RELATED HARDWARE. Recommendation of Park Superintendent, with concurrence of City Manager, that bid of Floyd Miller for furnishing chain link fencing and related hardware for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1964, be accepted.

23. BID - COPPER TUBING. Recommendation of Water Superintendent, with concurrence of City Manager, for acceptance of bid of Gordon Supply Co. in the amount of \$6,903.71 be accepted.

24. BID - FERTILIZER AND TOP DRESSING. Recommendation of Park Superintendent, with concurrence of City Manager, for accepting bids for furnishing fertilizer and top dressing for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1964.

25. BID - CHEMICALS AND SPRAY MATERIAL. Recommendation of Park Superintendent that bid of Alco Chemical Company for furnishing chemicals and spray material for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1964, be accepted.

Councilman Beasley moved to concur in the recommendation as set forth in each of Items 22, 23, 24 and 25 listed, with the additional wording as to Item 22 "subject to a performance bond" Councilman Vico seconded the motion and it carried as follows:

At the request of Mayor Isen, City Clerk Coil assigned a number and read title to:

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
TORRANCE, ADOPTING AND SUBMITTING A BUDGET FOR
EXPENDITURE OF FUNDS ALLOCATED FROM THE STATE
HIGHWAY FUNDS TO CITIES.

Councilman Beasley moved to adopt Resolution No. 64-120 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Miller, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

27. City Attorney submitting for approval and payment statement for professional services, Civil Service hearings re Lt. Cook and Lt. Hamilton, in amount of \$1,869.00.

Councilman Beasley moved to concur in the recommendation of the City Attorney and City Manager that the statement be approved and paid. His motion was seconded by Councilman Sciarrotta and carried as follows:

Sciarrotta, Vico, and Mayor Isen.
NOES: COUNCILMEN: None.

Mayor Isen said he hopes in the future it will be possible to hire an attorney at a lesser amount per hour in case the City needs one. However, this amount was predetermined and authorized by Council action.

28. City Attorney submitting for approval and payment statement from Burnison, Ritti & Associates, for transcript in the Hamilton and Cook Civil Service hearings, in the amount of \$636.45.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to approve and pay this statement. His motion was seconded by Mayor Isen and carried as follows:

Councilman Beasley moved to concur in the recommendation and his motion, seconded by Councilman Miller, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

30. EXPENDITURES OF OVER \$300.

1. \$317.72 to Lewellen Press for imprinting pages of Code of Torrance, 125 copies of each of 47 pages, a budget item.
2. \$942.24 to Travelrain Power Sprinkler Co. for 2 Travelrain sprinklers and 8 50 ft. lengths of 1" heavy duty water hose to be used for the dust control project at the Civic Center, confirming an emergency purchase.

Councilman Miller moved to concur in the recommendation to approve the two listed items. His motion was seconded by Councilman Vico and carried as follows:

AIRPORT MATTERS:

31. REPORT OF COUNCIL AIRPORT COMMITTEE RE T HANGAR LEASES.

Councilman Olson moved that the Airport Manager be allowed to extend the deadline of July 1st as contained in his notification to the parties concerned, where necessary in his discretion for a period of not longer than ninety (90) days. Mayor Isen seconded the motion. Roll call vote was unanimously favorable.

32. REQUEST OF GEORGE H. WHITTLESEY DBA WHITTLESEY MOTORS FOR CONSENT TO SUBTENANCY ON HIS LEASEHOLD. Airport Manager submitting recommendation of Council consent.

The recommendation is to consent to the proposed subtenancy of Messrs. Kenneth W. Wolcott and Robert Hubbard on the Whittlesey leasehold to operate an auto body and fender repair shop.

Councilman Miller asked if this should not also be sent through channels, noting that the negotiation was done by telephone. City Manager Ferraro stated it is a different situation than the Levitt matter referred to by Councilman Miller. Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur in the recommendation of the City Manager and the Airport Manager, including provision for an application form and \$20 fee. Councilman Beasley seconded that motion which carried by unanimous roll call vote.

COMMUNITY AFFAIRS:

33. Traffic and Lighting Engineer submitting report requested by Council concerning the downtown carnival.

The report was ordered filed as informational and Councilman Beasley moved that the Council do not grant any permits for carnivals, as a matter of policy. Councilman Lyman seconded the motion.

City Manager Ferraro exhibited some snapshots taken which bear out the statements in the report and License Director Whitacre stated if carnivals are to be prohibited, an ordinance should be prepared to do so. Councilman Beasley and the second to his motion agreed to add that instruction to the City Attorney to the motion, and asked that he work in conjunction with Staff and the City Manager in drafting such legislation. Roll call vote was unanimously favorable. Certain exceptions as to churches, kiddy rides were mentioned, if the organization puts on the activity itself. A report will be furnished by City Manager on this.

ITEMS NOT OTHERWISE CLASSIFIED:

34. RELEASE OF OIL WELL BOND NO. 01-B-42392. Recommendation of License Director, with approval of City Manager, that subject bond be terminated.

35. DELETION FROM OIL WELL BOND NO. 1518663. Recommendation of License Director, with approval of City Manager, that Spencer Community Well No. 3 be deleted from subject bond.

Councilman Sciarrotta moved to concur in the recommendations as to Items 34 and 35 and his motion, seconded by Councilman Lyman, carried by unanimous roll call vote.

ADDENDA:

36. IMPROVEMENT OF DEL AMO BOULEVARD FROM 1800 FT. EAST OF, TO HAWTHORNE AVENUE. Recommendation of City Engineer, with concurrence of City Manager, that City Council approve project, allocate funds therefor from Collier-Unruh Gas Tax monies, and authorize H. E. Baker Construction Co. to construct the improvements.

The recommendation is that the City Council approve the project; that \$76,000 from 1963-64 Collier-Unruh Gas Tax funds be allocated therefor; and that H. E. Baker Construction Co. be authorized to construct the improvements, and it is concurred in by the City Manager. Total cost: \$99,584.36.

Councilman Beasley moved to concur and Councilman Lyman seconded the motion which carried by unanimous roll call vote:

AYES: COUNCILMEN: Beasley, Lyman, Miller, Olson,
Sciarrotta, Vico, and Mayor Isen.

NOES: COUNCILMEN: None.

37. City Manager Ferraro reminded the councilmen of the work sessions which would resume on Wednesday at 4:30 p.m.

38. Councilman Beasley announced the change in name of Pacific Coast Highway, or 101 Highway, which is now called Highway No. 1 from San Diego to Eureka, in compliance with the new numbering system.

39. Councilman Beasley stated he learned in Sacramento that a contested condemnation suit has been filed for the 100 acres of college site at Palos Verdes.

40. Councilman Sciarrotta called attention to the survey made of Commission absences and stated the only commission which has authority to excuse absence is the Civil Service Commission.

41. Councilman Sciarrotta said he has been informed some apartment houses are renting to minors and the City Attorney was asked to determine if anything should, or could be done about that.

42. Mayor Isen asked that a letter be directed to the Boy Scouts organizations who have taken care of placing the flags in their holders recently. Each member of the council has received letters on many subjects, but one which Mayor Isen wanted the meeting to know about was a letter from Cecil Hudson, 17016 Van Ness Avenue commending the show of flags. Mayor Isen asked especially that a suitable reply be sent to Mr. Hudson and that a special letter also go to the Boy Scouts who did their good deed on Flag Day.

43. Mr. Roy Freiler of 4244 West 178th Street, representing a group of people who live on 179th and 178th between Amie and Hawthorne, protested the condition of the neighborhood brought about by the operation of the Jack in the Box. He stated he had asked the Traffic Commission for NO PARKING between 179th and 178th on Hawthorne which is being used by people waiting for hamburgers. They throw rubbish and discarded food into the 40 foot strip and it blows down the residential streets and makes a real mess which attracts rodents. He asks for No Parking on both sides.

Another complaint from Mr. Freiler was as to a fireworks stand in that 40 foot strip. It is on private property in an R-1 zone. He felt the mess and confusion which will result from purchase of fireworks will add to the nuisance created by the hamburger stand.

Mayor Isen asked the License Director to take cognizance of the fact and make a notation in the file so this location will not be used next year. It is too late to correct it as to this year. City Manager Ferraro asked if the wall is not sufficient protection and Mr. Freiler said it is not.

44. Mr. E. D. Grinsley of 4320 West 178th Street, also spoke about the fireworks stand and in general about a zoning case which is to come before Council soon.
